Special Company From the 71st Regiment Left for Halifax Last Evening to Perform Garrison Duty

The special company selected from the 71st Regiment for garrison duty at Halifax was given a hearty send-off last evening and large crowds of citizens thronged Queen and York streets to cheer the soldier boys as they marched to the C. P. R. station, headed by the 71st Regimental Band and the Fredericton Brass Band.

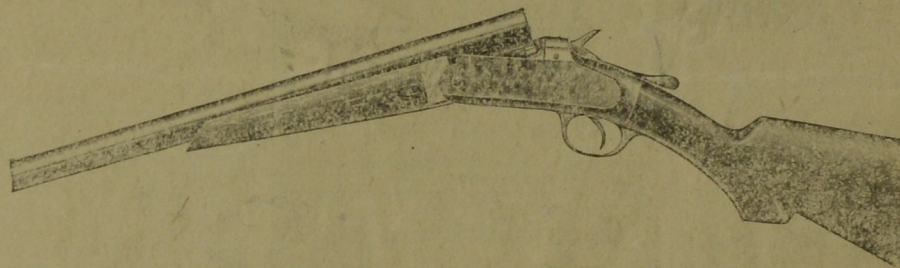
