LETTER FROM COM- MODORE STEWART, M. P. P.

To the Editor of The Mail:

Sir,—As everybody who is taking part in the present campaign in York has been already shown up as a liar by his opponents, even clergymen, I might well allow falsehoods about myself to pass unnoticed. But there is a limit even to my indifference. According to your report of the nomination day speeches, a marked copy of which has been received from a friend, Mr. Guthrie said to Mr. Thomas, "J. L. Stewart voted for you." Now, sir, I would consider myself guilty of a dirty mean trick, a bit of monumental gall to attend a York convention and vote or attempt to vote. The assertion is, of course, as inexcusably untrue as it is slanderous. Mr. Thomas, The Mail and others, who falsely intimated that a few outsiders (including myself) voted for Mr. Guthrie, because we were present as spectators, based the falsehood on the theory that all who didn't enter the enclosure for Thomas were counted for Guthrie. Mr. Thomas, seeing how small a percentage of the gathering voted for him, cried, "Enough, I am satisfied," and the Guthrie men were not asked to enter the enclosure or hold up hands to be counted or otherwise declare their purpose. If there had been any count the two visitors from Northumberland, being well known to the candidates and their friends, would not, of course, have been counted for either candidate, even if they had fraudulently sought to vote.

not take over the National Transcontinental in 1915 on the completion of the road there are two alternatives. The government itself might operate it as an extension of the I.C. R. to Winnipeg, or it might be picked up at a bargain by the C.N.R. on rental terms in connection with the proposition to release the Intercolonial to the C.N.R.

And finally, the grand ultimate object might then transpire. There are persistent and apparently well founded rumors that the C.P.R. has its eye on the whole C.N.R. system with a view to purchase perhaps a couple of years hence when the financial way has been properly paved. The grand coup may be pulled off by the C.P.R. taking over the C.N.R. with the National Transcontinental included at bargain rates two years hence. That would give the C.P.R. with the Grand Trunk as a lesser competitor, a virtual monopoly of the whole railway business of the dominion with public ownership finally and effectually killed.

There is much more in the report of Messrs. Gutelius and Lynch-Staunton than appears on the surface.

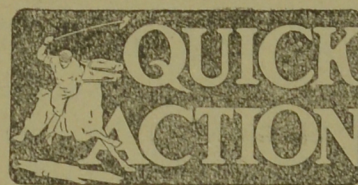
