CHATHAM TEAM FAST.

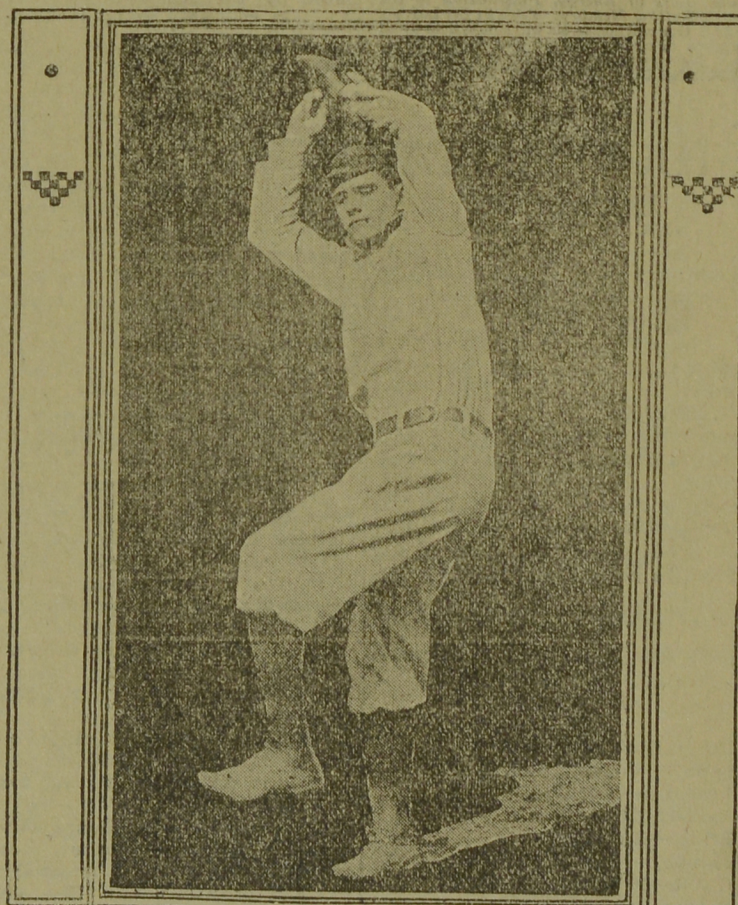
