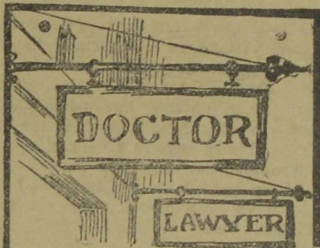

HOT POLITICAL FIGHT
IS NOW ON IN TEXAS

Austin, Texas, July 11—One of the
 hottest political battles the Lone
 Star State has seen in years is rap-
 idly approaching a climax. Two
 weeks from next Saturday the Demo-
 cratic voters of Texas will engage in
 a State-wide primary to determine,
 first, who is to succeed Joseph W.
 Bailey in the United States senate,
 and second, whether Governor Col-
 quitt shall succeed himself or be re-
 tired from office. At the same time
 candidates will be named for Lieuten-
 ant governor and all other impor-
 tant State officers, for judges of the
 supreme court of appeals, members
 of the legislature and county officers.
 But so far as the general public is
 concerned the interest is centered al-
 most exclusively in the fight for the
 senatorship.

Immediately Senator Bailey an-
 nounced his purpose to retire last
 winter the canvass for his seat be-
 gan. The followers of William J.
 Bryan, who had long fought Mr. Bail-
 ey, set out to get the place. Con-
 gressman Morris Sheppard of this
 first district, admittedly one of the
 ablest members among the younger
 Democrats in the House, was chosen
 to lead. He started out in determin-
 ed fashion, but within a month his
 health gave way and he was com-
 pelled to announce his retirement.

With the retirement of Sheppard the
 leadership of the radicals was taken
 up by Cone Johnson, who previously
 had been the center of several stormy
 campaigns, having for their object
 the unseating of Bailey. Johnson
 found, however, that the pace set by
 his rivals in covering the great dis-
 tances involved in a stumping tour
 of the State was too hot, and after
 entering a round of speechmaking was
 compelled to go to a sanitarium at
 Fort Worth. In the middle of April
 he announced his retirement from the
 race.

The radical leaders were in a panic
 when the decision of Johnson was
 made known to them. But were soon
 relieved when word came to them
 that Congressman Sheppard, after a
 month or more in a sanitarium, had
 recovered his strength and would re-
 enter the race. Since that time Mr.
 Sheppard has been actively in the
 fight.

Mr. Sheppard is for the initiative
 and referendum and the recall as part
 of the State's machinery of govern-
 ment. He also stands with Mr. Bryan
 in the demand that free raw ma-
 terials shall be part of the Demo-
 cratic tariff policy. The same poli-
 cies are advocated by Congressman
 Choice B. Randall, also a candidate
 for Senator Bailey's seat, and who
 has declined to listen to the plea of
 the Sheppardites to withdraw from
 the race and leave the field clear for
 Mr. Sheppard as the sole choice of
 the radicals.

The Conservative standard bearer
 is Col J. F. Wolters of Houston, who
 is strongly fighting the so-called radical
 ideas put forward by the Bryan-
 ites. Col. Wolters is a born fighter
 and he has an acquaintance with Tex-
 as politics that makes him a formid-
 able opponent. Besides attracting
 the moderates of the party, he is ex-
 pected to receive strong support from
 the sheepmen and cattlemen who are
 opposed to the free raw materials
 policy advocated by Sheppard and
 Randall.

Notwithstanding the fact the State
 wide prohibition question has no di-
 rect bearing upon the United States

senatorship, this is one of the chief
 issues of the campaign. Wolters was
 chairman of the anti-prohibition cam-
 paign last year, and naturally has
 against him the prohibition element.
 State-wide prohibition was defeated
 by only a little more than 6,000
 votes at the election, at which men
 of all parties voted.

It is claimed by prohibition leaders
 a test of the strength of the Demo-
 crats alone on this question will
 show the "drys" in a good majority.
 The prohibitionists almost to a man
 are giving their support to Sheppard.
 Randall is an anti-prohibitionist, al-
 though he did not take any active
 part in the fight on that question in
 Texas. It is the general opinion, how-
 ever, the anti-prohibition vote will
 be divided between Wolters and Ran-
 dell, which, of course, would redound
 to the benefit of Sheppard, as he is
 the only prohibitionist in the race.

The contest for the governorship is
 almost as bitter as the fight for the
 senatorship, though not so compli-
 cated. Governor Colquitt in his bat-
 tle for a renomination has but one
 opponent, Judge W. F. Ramsey of
 the State supreme court. Judge Ram-
 sey is a prohibitionist leader and is
 making a hard fight to secure the
 support of all of the advocates of
 prohibition in his fight for the nom-
 ination for governor.

The campaign for the senatorship
 and the State officers alike has been
 one of speechmaking and there is
 scarcely a city or town of any im-
 portance in the State that has not
 heard the leading candidates. From
 present indications the battle will be
 waged with unabated vigor up to the
 very hour for the opening of the polls
 on primary day.

CHICAGO TO ENTERTAIN HIBERNIANS

Chicago, Ill., July 13—Secretary
 James T. McGinnis of Scranton, Pa.,
 today opened headquarters for the
 national convention of the Ancient
 Order of Hibernians, which is to hold
 forth in Chicago during the whole
 of the coming week. Secretary Mc-
 Ginnis says that the convention will
 probably be the largest in the history
 of the organization. Delegates
 from every section of the United
 States and Canada will be in at-
 tendance. The Chicago branches of
 the organization have made elabo-
 rate preparations for the entertain-
 ment of the visitors. The gathering
 will open Monday night with a
 grand ball. Tuesday morning the
 delegates will march to the Cathed-
 ral of the Holy Name where a
 pontifical mass will be celebrated by
 Archbishop Quigley. The convention
 sessions will be opened at noon of
 the same day with an address by
 the national president James J.
 Regan of St. Paul. Wednesday night
 a banquet will be given at the Audi-
 torium. The business sessions will
 conclude Friday with the election
 of officers. Special entertainment has
 been arranged for Saturday and
 Sunday.

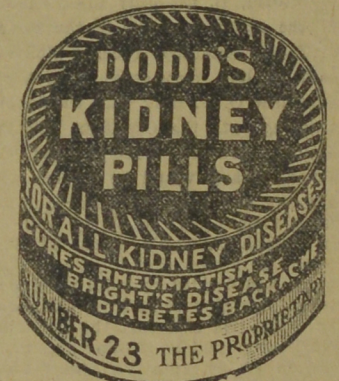

ANNUAL CELEBRATION IN FRANCE

Paris, July 13—The French capital
 today a garb of "patriotic colors in
 anticipation of the customary cele-
 bration of the national holiday to-
 morrow, which will be the one hun-
 dred and twenty-third anniversary of
 the fall of the Bastille and the be-
 ginning of the French Revolution.
 The popular merry-making began this
 evening with the customary street
 balls, in which the pleasure-loving
 Parisians take such delight. The
 boulevards were thronged with gay
 crowds and in all the parks and
 public squares there were band con-
 certs provided by the municipality.
 The big spectacular feature of the
 celebration tomorrow will be, of
 course, the grand military review at
 Longchamps. For the review this
 year, there is to be an added at-
 traction for the masses. This will
 be the presence of Moulay Hafid, the
 picturesque Sultan of Morocco, which
 has recently been made a protector-
 ate of France. The Sultan will at-
 tend the review as the special guest
 of President Fallieres.
