## THE SASKATCHEWAN ROUTE

The defeat of the Tory hosts in Saskatchewan on Thursday was complete and overwhelming. Out of a total of fifty-four members which will comprise the new Legislature it does not look at the time of writing as if Hon. Mr. Haultain, the opposition leader, will be able to muster more than eight or ten supporters. Never in the history of Canadian politics has such a brazen attempt been made to coerce a free people as was made in this case by Hon. Mr. Rogers and the agents of the Federal Government and never has a political party met with such a crushing and well merited rebuke. The Tories went into the fight well heeled with the resources of civilization. Hon. F. G. Haultain posed as their nominal leader, but the power behind the throne was the Hon. Robert Rogers, Minister of the Interior in the Borden Government, and one of the most daring and unscrupulous Tory politicians in all Canada. He had the active assistance of an army of political crooks from Manitoba, men skilled in every device known to the election heeler. They were backed up by the influence of the Dominion Government, admitted by the Montreal Star to be more potent in Saskatchewan than in any other province of Canada. They resorted to the most desperate methods known to political warfare, yet they have been defeated and crushed by the honest unpurchasable electorate of the great prairie province of Saskatchewan. Considering the powerful influences arrayed against them, the victory won by the Liberals of Saskatchewan on Thursday is by long odds the most notable ever achieved by a political party in any province of the Confederation. They routed the enemy horse, foot and artillery and Liberals all over Canada are rejoicing with Premier Scott and his colleagues over the splendid result which has been achieved.

Premier Scott in the recent campaign nailed the banner of reciprocity to the masthead; it was made the chief issue in the fight and the people by an overwhelming majority have declared in favor of larger markets. Saskatchewan is by long odds the greatest wheat growing province in Canada. Its population is increasing very rapidly, and increased population means increased production of wheat. The loyalty cry seems to have been worked by the Tories for all it was worth, but it cut no figure with the sturdy farmers of Saskatchewan. Their most urgent need is a market for their produce, and this was the paramount issue during the election. The farmers of the West do not propose to allow themselves to be dictated to by the monied interests of the East. They think and act for themselves and they know that markets must be found for their steadily increasing output, otherwise there can be no real prosperity for the great basic industry of agriculture in either the east or west.

All honor to the sturdy men of Saskatchewan who have so nobly upheld the principles of Liberalism.

Dr. Simpson, president of the Winnipeg Conservative Association in discussing the great Liberal victory in Saskatchewan says that such a sweep is not good for the government as such a state of affairs is liable to make the ministry autocratic. If what the doctor says is right, it will not be long before the Fleming government starts in putting on airs.

About two months ago we were told by Mr. O. S. Crockett, M. P. that as a result of his efforts the post office building was to be enlarged and improved. The summer is fast slipping away and it is almost time that tenders were being invited for the work. Mr. Crockett should stir up the Ottawa authorities.

1912 does not appear to be a very good year for defeating governments.

In Provincial elections held since the Borden government came into power the Tories made gains in New Brunswick and P. E. Island. The province of Saskatchewan which was almost swept clean by the Liberals on Thursday will send more members to the federal parliament at the next election than New Brunswick and P. E. Island combined.

No less than \$14,000 worth of potatoes grown in Central New Brunswick found their way into the United States market during the past three months. Surely there must be something wrong with that wonderful home market we heard so much about during the last Federal election campaign.

The St. John Standard is as dumb as an oyster today in regard to the great Liberal victory in Saskatchewan. It even fails to publish the result of the contest as a matter of news.

Considering the enormous influence they had behind them the Tories of Saskatchewan made even a worse showing than did the Liberals of New Brunswick.

The farmers of Central New Brunswick who shipped \$88,000 worth of hay to the United States during the past three months would surely be benefited by reciprocity.

Premier Fleming addressed an open air meeting at Newcastle yesterday, but strange to say made no reference to the battle of the Boyne.

## ROW AT BELFAST.

Belfast, Ireland, July 12—Fifty thousand Orangemen, drenched by a torrential downpour, celebrated the anniversary of the Battle of the Boyne today by their customary march to White Abbey, where Frederick E. Smith, a Unionist leader in the House of Commons, delivered a vigorous anti-home rule speech.

An attempt by two hundred youthful Nationalists early this morning to tear down an orange arch, led to a brief but sharp conflict between the Orangemen and the Nationalists, in which stone throwing was indulged in until the police with a baton charge, dispersed the demonstrators. Two policemen were hurt and one arrested was made.

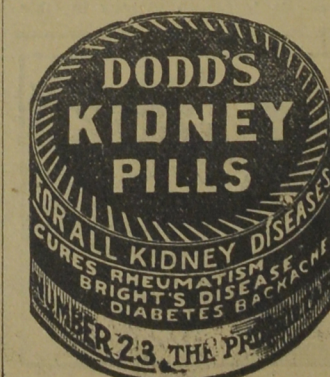
