### Canadian Horses Won the First Big Pacing Event

Joe Patchen II, Grand Opera and Knight Onwardo Took First, Second and Third Money of Comstock \$5,000 Purse--Patchen Expected to Annex Major Honors at Kalamazoo

Grand Rapids, Mich., July 11--Canada tugged off first, second and third money in the first \$5000 pacing race of the year. The three-horse team that hauled the currency was made up of Joe Patchen II, Grand Opera and Knight Onwardo.

The big purse was no contest as far as first place was concerned, for Joe Patchen II was never extended, but there was a lively scramble for second each time, which pleased the gallery, numbering about 4000. The conditions were ideal for speed and the track fast.

Sadie Hal landed a fast pacing stake, while Anvil was peer of all trotters, being in just about as soft a spot as the big Patchen stallion. Joe Patchen II has been heralded as a coming champion ever since he won a series of ice races in Canada last year. An accident threw him out of training, but he recovered and today he looks to be in a class by himself.

Barring accidents, he will annex the \$5000 purse at Kalamazoo next week and the Chamber of Commerce stake at the Blue Ribbon meeting a week later just as easily, although he will have to go faster.

#### TROUBLE FOR BIG HORSE.

Snow doubtless will send Sadie Hal after the big horse next week and on her form today she is apt to pace close to 2:04 on a good track. The race won by Sadie Hal showed her to be a high-class mare with a lot of brush and courage.

#### ANVIL LOOKS GOOD.

The early season promise from Memphis is to the effect that Anvil is headed for honors this year will materialize if nothing happens to the horse. He won without effort today and lowered his record, being up to a mile around 2:06 right now, so that he is apt to be among the best trotters of the year.

Seven started in the big race and Snow lost no time in betting to the front with Grand Opera, but was passed on the turn by Joe Patchen II and Pearl Patch. The latter had enough at the head of the stretch and Grand Opera was able to hold second by a neck, and an open length back of the leader.

Cox was a contender with Baron A, but the horse finally broke and was the far side of the flag.

Nine started in the 2:09 pace, which was a steller speculative affair. Columbia Fire and Mollie Darling were strongly supported, with Sadie Hal third choice, but at the post Sadie was selling against the field. The first heat was a brilliant race, Sadie chasing Mollie Darling, but caught her inside the distance and won easily by half a length in 2:05.

Mollie Darling rushed away again in the second heat, but Sadie Hal began to step up on the bend and Mollie Darling gave it up. Cox came scooting along with Forest Prince, but Sadie Hal won rather handily by a neck.

#### WORK OUT FOR ANVIL.

The 2:09 trot was a good workout for Anvil, hardly more. Elizabeth Ray and Cheney kept him moving and he reduced his M. and M. record a second.

They loafed to the three-quarters in the second mile and then Cheney came up. Geats let Anvil move the final quarter in 31 seconds. Cox tried hard with Chatty Direct, but only finished at Cheney's saddle.

The 2:14 trot was somewhat of an upset, Dandy Wood falling in the dust. Dandy Wood led all the way in the opening heat, just stalling off Victor Star in the stretch and winning by a nose.

In the next one Dandy Wood broke early and Marion K led to the half, then she jumped, and Emma G led to the stretch, where Victor Star trotted by her. Victor Star fought out the other heats with Derby Boy, winning each time in the last eighth, but rather comfortably. Valentine seems to have a fair trotter in this one.

The 2:18, left over from Wednesday, required three more heats, as Pretoria Mc marched away with two quite badly, but in the sixth Murphy kept Queen Lake on a trot and rushed both the others in the last part.

Fredericton Horse Took his Race in Straight Heats--Frank Patch won Free-for-all

A fairly good crowd attended the races at Moosepath Park yesterday afternoon and saw two good contests, the 2.24 trot and the free-for-all. Both races were won in straight heats, the first race going to Bottom, owned by L. B. C. Phair, of Fredericton, and the second race to Frank Patch, owned by James Adams of Halifax.

All of the heats in both races were well contested, the first heat of the free-for-all making the spectators get on their feet. The Patch horse and Aleydi finished neck and neck for first place, Vesta Boy and Gallagher putting up a great fight for third position.

In the first race Bottom had things pretty much his own way winning all three heats quite handily. Achille the Great put up a great race but was set back in both the first and third heats for running. In the first heat he finished second but was set back to fourth place. In the third heat he finished second but was put back to third.

#### FREE-FOR-ALL

The free-for-all brought out four starters--Frank Patch, owned by James Adams and driven by Frank Adams; Vesta Boy, owned by the Summerside Speed and B. Club and driven by D. Steele; Aleydi, owned and driven by D. D. Warman, of Province, and Gallagher, owned and driven by L. Acker. Ed. Wilkes and Bingcas were drawn. Patch won in three straight heats, but was given quite a run by Aleydi in a couple of the heats. Gallagher was a little bit off color and the best he could do was to finish third in the first heat. He was placed fourth in both the second and third heats.

Vesta Boy acted very badly, breaking in nearly all of the heats. The best time made was in the third heat which was finished in 2:17. The first heat was run in 2:18 and the second in 2:19. Frank Patch won first money. Aleydi second, Vesta Boy third and Gallagher fourth. The stake for the race was a \$300 purse.

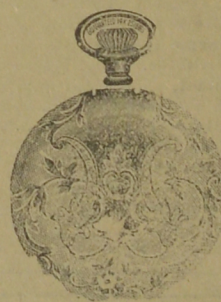
