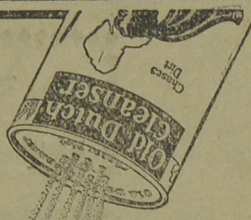

The usual brilliant assemblage
thronged the Senate Chamber on
Thursday when, His Royal High-
ness the Governor General opened
the third session of the twelfth
parliament of Canada.

At three o'clock when the
thunder of the guns announced the
approach of the Duke of Con-
naught, the floor of the red cham-
ber was thronged with ladies in ele-
gant gowns the brilliance of whose
coloring vied with black and gold
of the privy councillors' uniforms
worn by the present and past mem-
bers of the cabinet, the crimson and
ermion? of the judges of the Su-
preme Court and the striking array
of uniforms of every shade worn
by officers of the permanent and
volunteer forces.

Princess Patricia, who occupied a
seat at the right side of the throne,
was wearing a graceful gown of
powder blue chiffon velvet, with tu-
c of a darker shade of tulle em-
broidered in silver. She wore the or-
of the Star of India, of Sir John of
Jerusalem and the Victoria and Al-
bert the, jewels of which sparkled
and gleamed amid the tulle of her
corsage.

A brilliant staff surrounded the
Governor General as he entered the
chamber. Members of the suite who
were in attendance included: Lt.-
Col. Pantuhar, Hon. Katharine Vil-
liers, Miss Dorothy Yirke, Lord
Spencer-Compton, Captain H. C. Bul-
ler, A. D. C.; Captain the Hon. G.
Boscawen, A. D. C.; Captain A. G.
Graham, A. D. C.; Sir Edward Worthing-
ton, M. V. O., R. A. M. C.

Four of the lieutenant governors of
the provinces and their wives were
among the notables on the floor of
the House. They included the lieuten-
ant Governor of Quebec, Lady
Langelle and Miss Langelle, Hon.
Josiah Wood and Mrs. Wood of
New Brunswick, Sir John and Lady
Gibson and the Misses Gibson of
Ontario, and Sir Douglas and Lady
Cameron, of Manitoba.

vet wrap, pearls and amethysts.

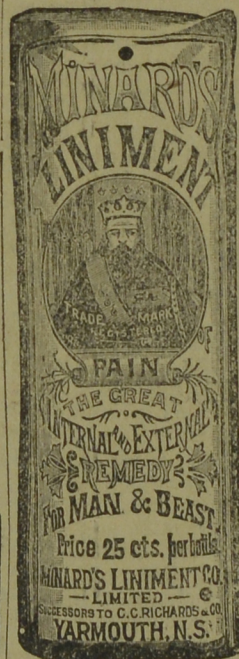
Miss Marjorie Ross, (Montreal)—

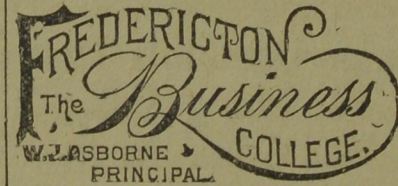
