## THE BORDEN GOVERNMENT SCORED BY SIR WILFRID

needed to be tapped by men of energy. The government... refused to accept the responsibilities of it.

The government, Sir Wilfrid said, who give the country wider markets could by a stroke of the pen give to the producers of wheat, the American market. Delegation after delegation had asked for free wheat; the grain growers had demanded it; the Manitoba legislature had passed a resolution to the same effect; the Alberta Conservatives had made the same request. Why did not the speech from the throne announce such a step? Sir Wilfrid then complained that farmers could not get help enough to produce sufficient meat, butter and other foodstuffs.

He next commented on the shipping, combines on the great lakes, and went on to discuss the high cost of living. In England the cost of living had increased ten per cent, and in Canada fifty per cent. The increase in the price of food products was not depreciated in itself, it was due largely to the increase in the cost of labor. But the cost to the consumer was not legitimate, parliament and the government should seek to reduce the gap between prices paid to the producer and the prices charged to the consumer. The tariff was not wholly responsible, but the restrictions of the tariff were the method used by the combine-esters to effect their purpose. The government could not afford to be idle. If the government did not act there were others able to take the reins of office. He would not pretend to be indifferent to office, but there were things more precious than office, the welfare of the country.

The leader of the opposition in conclusion moved the following amendment:

"We regret to have to represent to your royal highness that in the gracious speech with which you have opened parliament, whilst it admitted that the business of the country is in a depressed condition, yet there is no indication of any intention on the part of your advisers to take any steps toward relieving such a situation."

PREMIER BORDEN.

After expressing himself in complimentary terms upon the speeches of mover and seconder of the address, Right Hon. Mr. Borden made a graceful and felicitous reference to their royal highnesses, making especial mention of the unfortunate illness of the Duchess of Connaught.

Coming to Sir Wilfrid Laurier's speech, the premier dealt first with his complaint that there had been delay in the opening of parliament. The leader of the opposition, he said, if he desired to know why parliament had not opened in November should look around and see the members behind him. They all welcomed the change. The opening in November, followed by the long Christmas vacation, had proved unjust to those who came from a distance and the change in reality would expedite business. Replying to the reference to Mr. Meighen, Mr. Borden said that it was perfectly true that there were many men on the Conservative side who were competent to fill the post, whereas Sir Wilfrid Laurier, for five of his ministers, had had to go outside of parliament.

Referring to the attack on Mr. Foster for his absence, Mr. Borden said that Sir Wilfrid Laurier at all events minister of trade and commerce away should be well content to have the

However, he would observe that Mr. Foster was on the ocean and should be in his seat about Monday next.

Mr. Borden next dealt with the question of the highways bill. That Parliament—FIVE... had been a perfectly fair measure. It had conserved the interests of every province in Canada. The majority of the provinces would have been perfectly willing to accept it in the form in which the government had presented it. He himself had given his pledge that in the distribution of the allocation of money to the provinces should be in accordance with their population and the estimates had borne this out. When the measure was first introduced the Liberals had given it a half-hearted and lukewarm support but they had ended by voting squarely against it. The senate then, on Sir Wilfrid Laurier's responsibility, had inserted amendments which it knew the government could not accept. He intended to fix the responsibility for killing that bill upon the Liberals.

"Until such a majority of the senate, in the course of events, comes in accord with the wishes of the majority of this House, it is useless for us to reintroduce this bill," said Mr. Borden, amid government applause.

### EXCUSE FOR DROPPING BILL.

In regard to the naval aid bill, Mr. Borden said that the government, believing that immediate and effective aid was necessary, had introduced the bill last session in accordance with the mandate given by the people at the general election. The measure had been debated at great length, it had been persistently and definitely obstructed until the rules of the House had been amended, then the senate had refused to pass it. There was little doubt that if the measure had passed it would have had an immense influence in bringing about a cessation of the race of rival naval armaments.

The reasons for the defeat of the bill were not clearly understood in other countries and the mischievous and disloyal act of the senate was taken abroad to be a clear intimation to the world that Great Britain must stand alone in the matter of providing for her own defence.
