PUBLICITY GRANT
TO BE PLACED IN
CITY ASSESSMENT

Necessary Legislation Will be Applied
For by City Council--Board of
Trade Executive in Session
Last Night

The Board of Trade held a special meeting last night to receive the report of the scrutineers on the election of members of the executive. The report was adopted, the executive being as published previously. After the meeting of the board the executive met and held a lengthy session. Discussion was chiefly upon the question of the civic grant for publicity purposes. It was decided that a committee should wait upon the City Council and ask for the grant. This will be for the purpose of placing the matter upon record. A majority of the City Council already is pledged to support an application for legislation making provision in the annual assessment for a grant for publicity purposes. The grant is not to exceed \$2,500. Notice of application for such legislation already has been given by the city authorities.

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CHANGE IN RULES
OF DIVORCE COURT
WILL BE MADE

Forecasted by Judge McKeown To-day
---Maga Case Dismissed---Divorce
Granted in Blizard Case---Affidavits in Fenwick Case

At an adjourned sitting of the Divorce Court this morning His Honor Judge McKeown forecasted changes in the rules of the court under which the registrar would conduct examinations in connection with application for alimony and report to the judge.

The matter arose in connection with the case of Alberta Amelia Fenwick vs. G. Burton Fenwick. This case was undefended. George W. Fowler, K.C., of Sussex, for the plaintiff, closed his case at the last sitting of the court. This morning Francis Kerr of St. John, for the defendant, read two affidavits of the defendant bearing upon the application of the plaintiff for alimony. Mr. Kerr cited authorities to show that alimony should be furnished by the income from property. The affidavits were to the effect that the value of the defendant's property, the amount of his income and the extent of his business had been exaggerated by the plaintiff. In reply to one affidavit, Mr. Fowler read one from the plaintiff, which reaffirmed the previous statement. The other had been served on the 15th inst. and he had not had time to prepare a reply. An extension of time was given.




