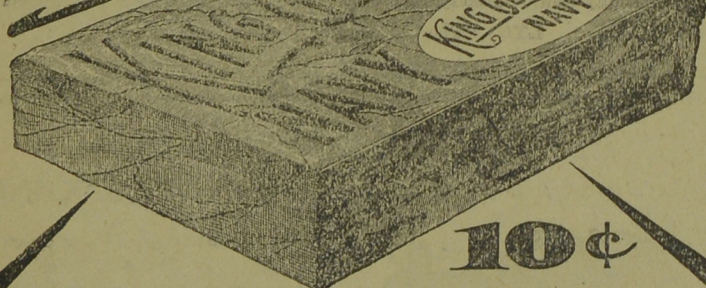
PERSISTENCY IN ADVERTISING

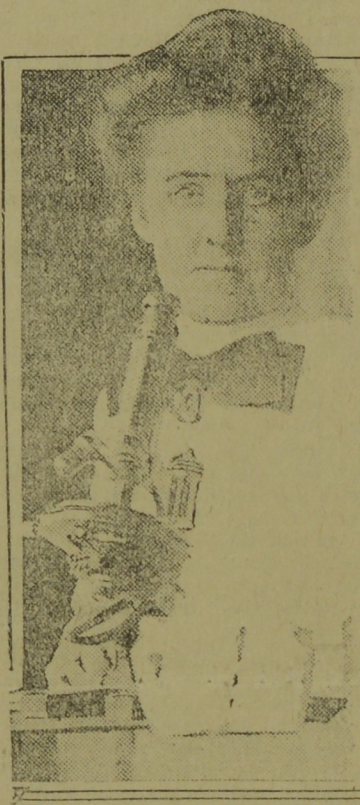
ASSISTING WOOL-GROWERS

Sheep-raising Industry to be Further Improved and Developed

The live stock branch of the Dominion Department of Agriculture is prepared to offer practical assistance to associations of wool growers in the preparation and display of their wool clips for market. Associations, in order to receive aid, must be organized in accordance with the regulations of the branch, and membership is limited to actual owners of sheep. West of Fort William an association must contain at least 3,000 sheep, or sufficient to comprise one carload of wool; east of there, a relative number. The services of expert wool classifiers, who will take charge of and perform the grading, classification and preparation of the wool, will be provided.

This proposal represents much more than a mere continuation of the work that has already been undertaken. It means the introduction of a definite scheme whereby wool producers may be actually assisted in preparing and presenting their wools upon the market in the most acceptable fashion, and thus be in a position to cater more directly to the requirements of the market. Moreover, it should prove effective in developing and improving the general status of sheep-raising and in creating an impetus to the production and preparation of an improved grade of wool, and indirectly, a better class of mutton.

Pursues the Stale Egg

Stale eggs are Dr. Alberta E. Read's specialty; her reputation as a chemist rests on stale eggs, and it is to her ability to keep stale eggs out of the United States housewife's pantry that she owes her unusual position.

As an expert chemist in the Government bureau of chemistry, it is Dr. Read's business to examine the frozen and dried eggs submitted to the bureau for inspection under the interstate commerce law and to see that all the "stored" egg product is pure and wholesome when given to the consumer. By applying chemical tests, she can tell for a certainty the age and "previous condition" of the eggs under inspection.

A Chicken Coop

A combination two-in-one poultry coop for setting hens and chickens is 6 feet long, 3 feet deep and is divided into four compartments by removable partitions. At the back of each compartment is a nest, at the front is a sliding door which opens into a detachable runway. The front of the little house is three feet high and has an opening in the upper half, lengthwise covered with wire screen and closed by a hinged door at the top. Four hens are set in this coop at one time. As soon as the chicks come, two of the partitions are taken out and one hen given both hatchlings, while the other hen is put to more profitable work. When the chicks are ready to do without the hen, the hens are taken out, the other two partitions removed and perches put in for the chicks to roost on. The runways in front are then taken away also.
