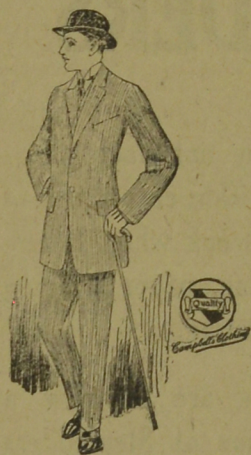

"ROYAL" TITLE GIVEN
CANADIAN INSTITUTE

"Please convey my warmest con-
gratulations to the Royal Canadian
Institute at their meeting tomorrow
night on the recognition and honor
conferred upon it by His Majesty."
(Sgd.) "ARTHUR."

Amid scenes of great enthusiasm
and in the presence of over a thou-
sand persons gathered in Convoca-
tion Hall, representing the elite of
Toronto society, the aforesaid Cana-
dian Institute last night became the
"Royal Canadian Institute," when
the title of "Royal" was presented
thereto by His Honor Sir John Gib-
son, K.C.M.G., the lieutenant govern-
or, representing His Royal Highness
the Duke of Connaught, who sent the
above telegram.

Sir John, in presenting the title,
spoke of the great value to Canada of
the Institute in promoting scientific
research. It was a distinction to be
a member, as members had contrib-
uted in no small measure to the pro-
gress of civilization. No higher tes-
timony of the value of the Institute
could be afforded than its recognition
by the King himself in conferring
thereon the title of "Royal." The
Duke of Connaught was largely re-
sponsible for this signal honor and
had proven his great interest in the
work the Institute promoted.

Sir John expressed the hope that
the future record of the Royal Cana-
dian Institute would amply justify the
title.

HONORED SIR

SANDFORD FLEMING.

Prof. A. P. Coleman made a speech
in which he eulogized Sir Sandford
Fleming and moved that he be elected
honorary president. This was sec-
onded by President Falconer, who
declared that in addition to any other
qualifications, Sir Sandford's
moral elevation of character was
such as to give him the right to any
honor which might be bestowed on
him. Sir Edmund Walker also spoke
to the same effect. In a letter sent
regretting his unavoidable absence,
Sir Sandford Fleming expressed the
hope that his three sons might be
made members of the Institute and
last night they were elected to that
position.

PRINCIPAL PETERSON'S

SUGGESTION.

The address of the evening was
delivered by Principal Peterson of Mc-
Gill University, who not only strong-
ly advocated further aid from the
state for the universities but also ad-
vanced the excellent suggestion that
a system of scholarships, closely fol-
lowing that obtaining in Scotland
with regard to the Ferguson Scholar-
ships, be instituted in Canada.

In the course of his address Prin-
cipal Peterson said that the Scottish
educational volume was the pattern
of progress all the world over.

"In Scotland there is a system of
inter-university scholarships, called
the Ferguson Scholarships, which for
over fifty years have done as much
as anything else to raise standards,
to encourage research and to bring
the universities together."

NOTED CASE COMES
TO TRIAL TODAY

Columbiana, Ala., April 7—A spe-
cial term of the Shelby County Cir-
cuit Court convened today for the
trial of James G. Oakley on a charge
of embezzling about \$3500 of state
funds. This is one of the cases in
which leading politicians of Alabama
have become involved and which is
attracting the keenest attention
throughout the state.

Oakley was president of the state
convict department at the time that
Theo Lacy left Montgomery carrying
with him about \$90,000 of state funds.
When Oakley was tried in Montgom-
ery County recently on another in-
dictment, he admitted that he had
used the state funds but that he did
so in the belief that he was using his
own money. He declared that in
1911 he paid over to Lacy, who was
then chief clerk of the state convict
department, \$27,500 and that he
thought that he was using this money
when he converted state checks. Lacy
recently was tried and convicted on
the charge of embezzlement. After
his conviction he declared that he
had given \$27,500 to Governor O'-
Neal. The latter replied that Lacy's
statement was wholly without founda-
tion and intimated that it had
been instigated by B. B. Comes to
further his aspirations for the gover-
norship.

WHY P. O. DEPARTMENT
BANNED "THE MENACE"

Ottawa, April 6—"Any paper dis-
cussing religion in an abstract way
is responsible for its own opinions,
and we do not in any way interfere
with such papers. Men may be Prot-
estant or Catholic in the extreme and
may hold their views in the extreme,
and give pronounced expression to
them in the most extreme way, and
the post office department would not
interfere at all. But when personal
abuse, reflecting on the honor and
chastity of women and on the clergy
of any denomination as a whole, is
indulged in, or when women of a cer-
tain faith are reflected on, as has
been done in The Menace, then this
department understands it as its
duty not to allow such things to pass
through the mails. This is the law
which the department has followed in
the past and intends to follow in the
future. It has been and will be ap-
plied impartially to all papers, Cath-
olic or Protestant, which may in-
clude in such matters."

In the above statement, issued in a
memorandum today by Dr. R. M.
Coulter, deputy postmaster general,
concerning the placing of the ban up-
on an American-Canadian publication
called The Menace and published in
the United States at Aurora, Mo., and
in Canada at Aurora, Ont., the pol-
icy of the department in connection with
such matters is enunciated.

In substantiation of the course fol-
lowed in respect to this paper there
is contained in the memorandum a
long list of quotations and headings
which the department believes jus-
tifies it in coming to the conclusion
that the paper comes within the law
prohibiting the transmission of "in-
decent, obscene, immoral or scurri-
lous literature."

WOULD HAVE BEEN

SAME IF CATHOLIC.

The memorandum states that if any
Catholic paper had indulged or should
indulge in such reflections as have
been indulged in by The Menace, most
certainly its privileges of the mails
would have been or would be cut off
at once.

"When this case was brought to the
attention of the department," con-
tinues the memorandum, "and when
the columns of the paper were exam-
ined and the statements contained
therein concerning many of the peo-
ple of our country, there was nothing
in the paper for the department to do but
to live up to the law and to debar this
paper from the privileges of the
mails."

The privilege of the mail has not
only been refused to the weekly pa-
per published at Aurora, Missouri,
but authorization has been refused to
establish a Canadian edition in Au-
ra, Ontario.
