MORE INTERESTING QUESTIONS REPLIED TO

Hon. Mr. Flemming in answer to Mr. Pelletier's inquiry said:—

1. Was the statement made by President Gould of the St. John & Quebec Railway Company in a newspaper interview of April 24, 1912, that "all financial arrangements have been satisfactorily completed. We put up a deposit of \$100,000 and we intend to fulfil our obligations to the letter" substantially correct?

A.—Yes substantially so.

2. If so, in what bank was the money deposited?

A.—The deposit was not in cash, but the bonds of a guarantee company as provided by the statute.

3. Why was the money deposited in a bank instead of with the government?

A.—Answered by answer to No. 2.

4. Was any commission paid by the Bank to any one in the knowledge of the Government or any member of it in consideration of this large deposit for several years?

A.—Answered by answer to No. 2.

Hon. Mr. Flemming in answer to Mr. Dugal's inquiry said:—

1. Has the government or any member of the government any knowledge of the arrangement made by Lisman & Co., of New York with the St. John & Quebec Railway Co. Ltd. for purchase and flotation of the second mortgage bond issue of \$10,000 per mile?

A.—The Government has no knowledge as to the details of any arrangement made by Lisman & Co., of New York, with the St. John & Quebec Railway Co., Ltd., for purchase and flotation of the second mortgage bond issue of \$10,000 per mile, but did have the assurance from Mr. F. J. Lisman that he would take the unguaranteed securities of the Company and provide at least \$7,500 per mile for each mile of railway for the construction of which the Province guaranteed \$25,000.

2. If so, what was the nature of the agreement and was it carried out?

A.—Answered by answer to No. 1.

3. Did any representative of Lisman & Co., interview the government or any member of it and give any assurance that they would take the mortgage bonds at a certain figure?

A.—Answered by answer to No. 1.

4. If so, what was that figure and was any money paid on account?

A.—Answered by answer to No. 1.

5. Was the government a party to the release of Lisman & Co., from their contract or have they been released?

A.—The government has not been a party to the release of Lisman & Co. in connection with the undertaking regarding the financing of the St. John & Quebec Railway.

6. Was not Lisman & Co., a responsible concern and financially able to carry out its contracts to pay 70 or 75, as the case may be, for the second mortgage bonds?

A.—Lisman & Co., were reported to the Government to be responsible and reliable, and that they carried out their undertaking.

7. Were not President Gould's arrangements with Lisman & Co., reported by him to the government and were they not in part a reason for the assurance that the Premier gave the people of New Brunswick "satisfactory financial arrangements."

A.—Yes.

NOT INTERESTED.

CONFERENCE OF WESTERN GOVERNORS

Denver, Colo., April 7.—The conference of western governors, which was organized at Salt Lake City a year ago, assembled in this city today for its second meeting. The attendance includes the governors or their delegated representatives from California, Idaho, Arizona, Colorado, North and South Dakota, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico, Oregon, Utah, Washington and Wyoming.

The purpose of the conference is to unite the Western States in a definite policy on public questions of common interest. The most important of these questions are those with which the states have to deal with the federal government, such as forestry, irrigation, water power and the conservation of the natural resources in general. The conference also will agree upon a program for the Western Irrigation Congress, which is to meet here Thursday in response to the call recently issued by Secretary Lane of the Interior Department.

GOVT. PREPARE TO HOODWINK PUBLIC

(From Le Temps, Ottawa.)

Before the Government surrenders publicly to Messrs. MacKenzie and Mann and allows them to fish forty or fifty millions of dollars more out of the public treasury, it will be necessary to stage a drama elaborately in order to conciliate the Canadian public, who, of course, will have to provide the funds. This theatrical display is indispensable from a political point of view, and the work of winning over adherents has been going on quietly in Parliament during the last fortnight.

Of course the Conservative caucus held on Wednesday, March 25, ostensibly to allow the Government to consult its supporters, was only a sham. The Hon. Robt. Rogers, W. T. White, and Mr. Borden knew perfectly well last session, at the time fifteen million dollars were voted for this railway that Messrs MacKenzie and Mann would return this year for a much larger grant and the Government would have to accede to their request.

PARTY FUNDS MAY BENEFIT.

The Government, however, even a Conservative Government, is obliged to take public opinion into consideration when arriving at a decision and this new request from MacKenzie and Mann being for a grant greatly in excess of last year's awakened suspicion and caused resentment in the public mind to such an extent that the Government thought it was necessary to impose rigorous conditions upon filibusterers. It is rumored in the lobbies that a contribution of \$750,000 is to be made to the campaign funds of the party. This would be a strong argument; but there is, of course, public opinion. To satisfy public opinion it would be necessary that the contractors should produce a statement of accounts showing what has been done with the money voted for the C.E.R. system. 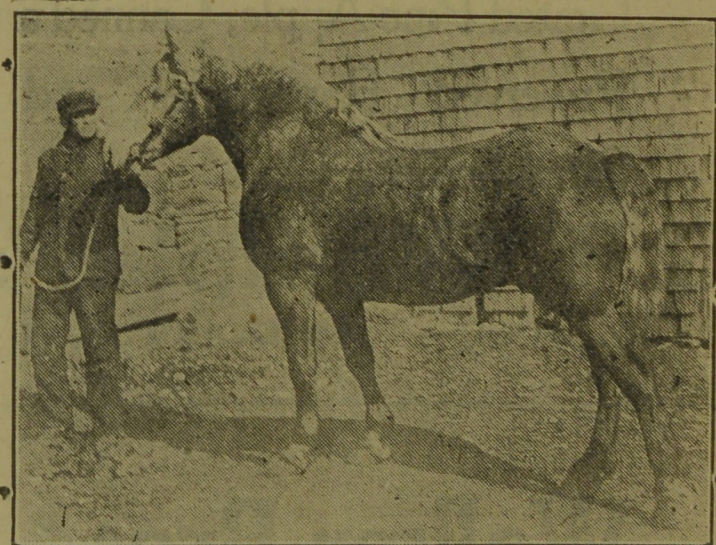
