LATE LUTHER GOODSPEED.

The funeral of the late Luther Goodspeed took place this afternoon from his late residence, Penniac, and was largely attended. Rev. Mr. McLellan of Marysville, conducted the service and interment was made at Penniac.

FROM THE MIRAMICHI.

Mr. Guy Welsh of Bristol, Carleton County arrived in the City last evening and is a guest at the Queen. Mr. Welsh is a son of the late Mr. Michael Welsh, the well known Miramichi lumberman, and succeeded his father in business. He operates a large saw mill near Foreston, on the Miramichi. He reports considerable snow in the Miramichi woods, and regards the outlook for driving to be good.

TO RUN FOR MAYOR

It is understood that H. R. McLellan, city commissioner for public safety, will be a candidate for the mayoralty in opposition to Mayor Frink of St. John. Mr. McLellan would not confirm the rumor last night. The commissioner of public safety led the polls at the time of his election two years ago and a contest for the position of chief executive of the city between him and Mayor Frink would no doubt prove a spirited one.

CHEAP FARES FOR EASTER HOLIDAYS.

For the Easter holidays the usual holiday excursion rates will prevail on the Intercolonial Railway between stations on the line. Round trip tickets at the one-way fare for round trip will be issued April 9th and 10th good for return April 10th.

There will be a special excursion rate also between stations on the line and to points on connecting lines and beyond Montreal, from April 9th to 12th, good for return April 14th.

F. B. B. TO REORGANIZE

The Fredericton Brass Band is about to reorganize and through a communication signed by T. C. Sutherland and W. C. Burt have applied to the City Council for the free use of the upper story of the old No. 1 Hose Station, Queen Street, West. The band agree to have the room painted and papered and to take proper care of it excluding all liquor, cards and intoxicated persons. The communication was referred to the Fire Committee. It is reported that upon reorganization Prof. McGinnis of the U.N.B. will lead the band.

MRS. STEVENS DEATH

Referring to the death of Mrs. Stevens a despatch from Portland, Me., says: "Mrs. Lillian M. Stevens, president of the National Women's Christian Temperance Union, died today. She has been ill for several weeks with kidney trouble. Mrs. Stevens, who was born in Dover, Me., seventy years ago, continued to the last the temperance work to which she had devoted most of her life. Her mind remained clear and late last week, she was able to dictate correspondence in connection with the duties of her office."

PRISONER DISCHARGED.

Before Judge Wilson in the Sunbury County Court at Burton yesterday the case of the King vs Andrew Stackable was heard, the prisoner electing to be tried under the Speedy Trials Act. J. T. Sharkey, clerk of the court, appeared for the crown, and P. J. Hughes for the accused. Stackable was charged with stealing a quarter of beef from Abner M. Belyea's butcher-shop at Minto. John Tobin, now serving thirty days in jail for the same charge, was called as a witness by Mr. Sharkey and entirely exonerated Stackable, who was discharged by the judge.

WRIT IS SERVED

The writ of mandamus issued by Judge Barry on the application of A. J. Gregory, K. C., counsel for Ex-Ald. W. E. Farrell calling upon the mayor, aldermen and commonalty of the city of Fredericton to show cause why an investigation of the recent mayoralty election should not be held was served upon G. R. Perkins, Acting City Clerk, yesterday afternoon. The writ was referred to the City Council in committee last night and after some discussion referred to R. B. Hanson, city solicitor, who will appear before the Supreme Court, April 14, to show cause.

TENNIS CLUB MEETING.

The Fredericton Tennis Club met last night and organized for the season. The officers elected are: Dr. T. C. Allen, patron, Prof. John Stephens, president, H. R. Babbitt, vice-president, Charles FitzRandolph, secretary, treasurer.

PAUPER LUNATIC
TAX HITS CITY
PRETTY HARD

Calls for Over Six Hundred Dollars Per Year--Discrimination Against Fredericton--City Council Wants Further Information

The legislation passed by the Flemington government with regard to the inmates of the Provincial Hospital, who are not supported at that institution by relatives bears heavily upon the city of Fredericton as the city council discovered last night when a bill for \$169 was received from Dr. J.W. Anglin superintendent of the Provincial Hospital for the upkeep of fifteen patients for one quarter. With the number of patients becoming no large the amount per year required to be paid by the city will be well over \$600.

Formerly the city paid for only one patient. Under the present law it must pay for fifteen at the rate of \$1 per week. There also has been discrimination against Fredericton in the amendment passed at the present session. By that amendment the number of patients each parish is compelled to pay for is reduced to six and in the case of the municipality of the City and County of St. John a limit is also set for the whole municipality. There is no limit however to the number which the taxpayers of Fredericton will be called upon to support.

The members of the City Council last night refused to pay the bill and have asked for further information from Dr. Anglin with regard to some of the patients. The opinion was expressed that Fredericton was not being dealt with fairly.

FRANK ROWAN
KILLED ON C.P.R.
AT MATTAWAMKEAG

Locomotive Driver Received Fatal Injuries This Morning as He Leaned From Engine Cab--Was Here Last Week

Frank Rowan, locomotive driver upon the C.P.R., suffered injuries at Meattawamkeag, Me., this morning about four o'clock which resulted in his death some hours later. The deceased was leaning from the window of his engine-cab and was struck by an iron pipe. He was taken to his home at Brownville, Me., and died there.

The deceased was a native of Lincoln and is well known here. With his brothers he was one of the owners of the tug Onawanda and during the season of navigation on the St. John River was engineer of that boat. He was here on Friday and Saturday last, making arrangements to have the boat put in the water after the ice-run. The late Mr. Rowan was well and favorably known throughout this section of the province and the bereaved relatives have the sympathy of all. He had worked as driver for the C.P.R. in Maine for about ten years past and previous to that had lived permanently in Fredericton.

The deceased was forty years old and is survived by a widow, a daughter of Squire Fred Smith of Lincoln, and four children, all living in Brownville. Five brothers and three sisters also survive. They are Arthur V., secretary of the St. John River Log Driving Company; Harry, Murray, Herbert and John, Mrs. Charles T. Duffy of Boiestown, Mrs. John Lynch of Boiestown, and Mrs. Peter Farrell of Fredericton. His mother also survives. Interment is to be made at Lincoln. The remains are expected to arrive tonight.

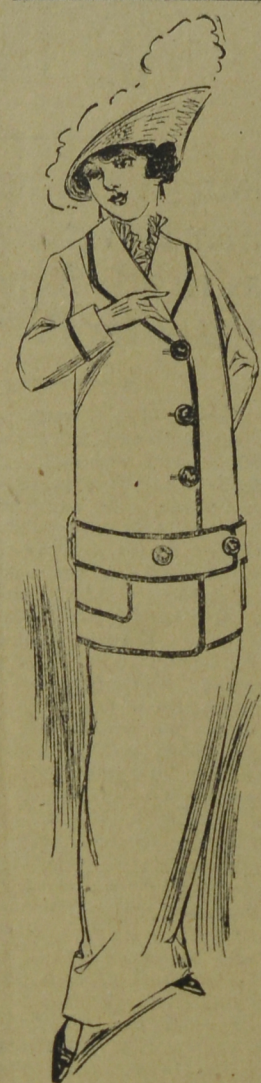

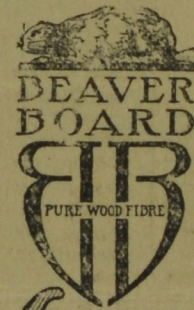
