MONCTON

VISITED BY SERIOUS FIRE

Moncton, N.B., Feb. 25--Moncton's market building, in which were located the city offices, is in ruins. About 3.45 o'clock this morning fire was seen in the rear of the city building on the ground floor and it had then made such headway that the flames were ready to burst through the windows.

Less than an hour after an alarm was sounded in, the whole city building was in flames. It was practically abandoned and efforts concentrated upon preventing the fire spreading. The brick walls of the burning building kept the flames pretty well in check but the forked tongues leaped from the windows in front and along both sides also and in the rear and the interior was a seething caldron with everything consumable being rapidly devoured. The night was spectacular and hundreds of citizens braved the twelve below zero weather to watch the conflagration.

When the walls began to crumble and fall there were narrow escapes. Several firemen playing on the fire in front of the Bank of Nova Scotia had a close call. A warning cry caused the men to back away from the building and scarcely had they done so when a large portion of the city building crashed to the sidewalk where they had stood.

Notwithstanding the efforts of the firemen the flames crossed West Market street and caught in a two-story building owned by J. A. Marven and J. S. Magee and occupied by Patur-el's fish market on the ground floor and the Liberal Club on the second floor. The building was destroyed. There was \$4,000 insurance on the building and the cost of construction was \$7,000.

be taken from the city staff. Contingent upon this and the securing of supply teachers of the necessary qualifications, the matter is left in the hands of the chairman and Dr. Crockett.

An application from the students of the High School for a half holiday today to witness the opening exercises of the House of Assembly was voted out of court in view of the present interpretation of law respecting authority of Trustees.

An application for position on city staff of teachers was read from Miss Carrie L. Andrews enclosing testimonial, and a like application from Miss Alice Louise Young. These names were ordered to be placed in applicants' book.

SALARY INCREASED.

An application for increase of salary presented at previous meeting was now considered and the Board seemed to think some attention should be given to a young teacher, who is obliged to hand most of her stipend to a livery stable in order to travel to and from her school every day in all kinds of weather. The sum of fifty dollars was added to the salary of Miss McKenzie for the current term.

NEW BUILDING.

Mr. Sterling from committee presented report respecting new building on Smythe Street and also some sketch plans of same. Upon request of Mr. Kenneth Campbell architect, he was presented to the Board and submitted some sketch plans for the Smythe Street Schoolhouse and explained same. It is understood Mr. Campbell has devoted much of his time to the study of this phase of architecture. After consideration the whole question was deferred until an adjourned meeting to be held next week.

An application from a committee of teachers addressed to the chairman, was read, asking that date of increase of salary be operative at once rather than be delayed until beginning of next school year in July. The Board could not grant this request.

The Secretary was directed to thank the Dept. of Agriculture, Ottawa for two volumes of report of Royal Commission on Technical Education.

After disposing of routine business the Board adjourned. The chairman and Mr. Sterling were appointed a committee to interview the Attorney General respecting legislation for Bond issue, etc.

EX-PRESIDENT TAFT TO SPEAK ON COURT REFORM

Washington, D.C., Feb. 26--Former President Taft is to be heard by the House Judiciary Committee tomorrow in advocacy of the Clayton bill, which is designed to effect reforms in federal court procedure. The measure would authorize the Supreme Court of the United States to prescribe forms and rules and generally to regulate the pleadings, procedure and practice on the common law side of the federal courts.

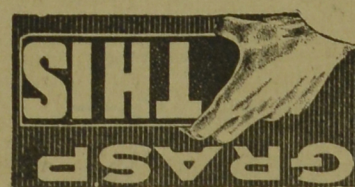
