THE MAPLE SUGAR QUESTION

The Canadian Forestry Journal deals with the maple sugar question

"At the annual meeting of the Canadian Forestry Association a re solution was passed supporting the efforts of the maple sugar makers to have a law enacted prohibiting the selling of adulterated maple syrup and sugar. The ground taken by the association was that owing to the lack of remuneration in the business if adulteration was allowed, farmers would clear off maple trees land that was not fit for anything else and that land would become permanently unproductive. That this was actually taking place is seen from an extract from a letter written by one of the leading bankers of the eastern townships of Quebec. He writes:

'In driving around the country I have noticed that not a few maple groves, which used to produce a considerable amount of sugar, have been cut down for fire wood. It seems to me a foolish thing to do.'

"The production of maple sugar is now valued at a little over \$2,000,000 per year and friends of the industry predict that it will now rise in a few years to \$7,000,000 or \$8,000,000. Maple groves, instead of being cut down, will be protected and new groves will be developed in wood lots or even set out again on abandoned or partly abandoned, farms."




