VOCATIONAL TRAINING

MUCH DESIRED BY
BOARD OF TRADE

That Body Passed Resolution Last Night Endorsing Resolution of City Council--Pres. Palmer Spoke Strongly in Support

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Trade took place last night and although the attendance was not large the members of the board took an important step in endorsing the action of the City Council in supporting the School Board in its efforts to inaugurate a more advanced system of Vocational Education in the public schools of the city.

RESOLUTION PASSED

The following resolution was passed on the motion of J. T. Jennings seconded by H. S. Campbell:—
RESOLVED—That the Fredericton Board of Trade most strongly endorse the following resolution passed by the City Council on June 2nd.

"WHEREAS—This Council has learned that it is the intention of the Board of School Trustees of the City of Fredericton to inaugurate a more advanced system of Vocational Education for boys, in addition to the Sloyd Work already taught, and also provide for teaching Domestic Science to Girls. The beginning to be made when the completion of the Smythe School renders room available in the present High School.
THEREFORE RESOLVED—That this Council heartily commends the project, and pledges itself to support the Board of School Trustees."

EXAMINATIONS HERE

Eight Graduates and Undergraduates of U. N. B. Writing Grammar School Papers--Examinations Continue till Friday

The examination for teachers' licenses began this morning and will continue until Friday at five p.m. Examinations are being held simultaneously at St. John, Chatham and Fredericton. Upwards of three hundred are writing the papers. The greater number, however, are writing here.

R. B. Wallace is chief supervisor of the examinations here, which are being written at the Normal School. As assistants he has G. E. Merrithew of the Education Office, and the members of the Normal School teaching staff.

The number of candidates writing the papers here is two hundred and ninety-eight. They are classified as follows:

Six members of the graduating class of 1914 of the University of New Brunswick are writing the Grammar School papers. They are Miss E. Beatrice Kirk, Miss Fred M. Weir, Miss Mildred E. Wallace, E. C. Rice and Robert L. Simms. Fred C. Cronkite and Hugh C. Titus, undergraduates at the U.N.B., are taking partial examinations. Elmer J. Alexander is also writing the Grammar School papers.
