COUNTRY MARKET.

There was a fairly large country market on Saturday in spite of the rain. The price of cultivated strawberries fluctuated considerably, being higher at the close of the market than at the first. The price per box was 12 to 16 cents. Wild strawberries sold for \$1.25 to \$1.50 per half pail. Lamb was 75 cents to \$1.50 per quarter, according to size. Potatoes were \$2 to \$2.50 per bbl.

LYING AND LURKING.

A young man and a middle-aged woman were arrested last night for lying and lurking in an alleyway off Brunswick street. They acknowledged the offense this morning in the police court, the man being given a sentence of five dollars or ten days in jail and the woman one of twenty-five dollars or thirty days in jail. Magistrate Limerick held that the woman was more responsible of the two.

REVISITING NEW BRUNSWICK.

Guy H. Payson of Winnipeg, arrived here today from Chatham by Intercolonial. He will leave this afternoon to revisit his home in Woodstock. Mr. Payson formerly was operator at the St. John office of J. M. Robinson & Son, bankers and brokers. For some time past he has been operating at the Winnipeg office of Cowan & McDougall. He has met a large number of Fredericton people in the west.

FOR HUDSON BAY.

About thirty men from this city and vicinity left Saturday night for Halifax, having been recruited by J. A. Gillis of Halifax, who is labor agent for the dominion government. The men are to go from Halifax to Port Nelson on Hudson Bay to work on harbor and other improvements there. They pay their own way to Halifax but are promised free transportation from that port to Hudson Bay, with pay at the rate of three dollars per day for all time after leaving Halifax. After staying fifteen months at Port Nelson they are to be given free return transportation to Halifax.

A DELICATE OPERATION.

A remarkable operation was performed at the Victoria Hospital a few days ago on a twelve-year-old boy named Sherman Jones, son of Mr. John Jones of Hainesville. The boy was suffering from a stoppage of the bowels and was rushed to the hospital in an auto by Drs. Morehouse and Jewett. He was taken in charge by Dr. H. H. McNally, who on opening him, found his condition to be very serious. His bowels had started to decay and the doctor was compelled to remove a piece two feet in length. The ends were then sewed together and the wound closed. The patient is now getting along nicely and a complete recovery is looked for.

LANDMARK OF
FREDERICTON
IS NO MORE

Miss Lucina Wilson Passed Away
Sunday After Lingered illness---
In Eightieth Year---Bequest to
Brunswick St. Baptist Church

Miss Lucina Wilson, who had come to be a landmark in this city, passed away Sunday afternoon at four o'clock at her home, Queen street. Death ensued after a lingering illness. The deceased rallied after a severe attack last winter but was taken ill again a few weeks ago and succumbed to the attack. The late Miss Wilson was in her eightieth year and leaves no immediate relatives. By the terms of a will made some time ago, her property is bequeathed to the Brunswick Street Baptist church, of the congregation of which she was a member for many years. During the pastorate of Rev. Dr. J. H. MacDonald some twelve years, Miss Wilson never missed a service at that church.

The funeral took place this afternoon at 3.30 from the Brunswick Street Baptist church, where the remains were taken. The funeral service was conducted by Rev. A. F. Newcomb. Interment was made in the Old Protestant Burying Ground, in the lot where the parents and the brothers of the deceased are buried.

The late Miss Wilson was a daughter of an escaped negro slave, who came to Fredericton from the Southern States early in the last century. He was familiarly known to Fredericton people as "Doctor" Wilson. He had the distinction of opening the first barber-shop the place ever had, and conducted the same until his death, which took place at an advanced age. SCOTT ACT IS
PRESENTED

Representative of Montreal Wholesale
Liquor House Served With Warrant
Saturday and Fined for
First Offense

The Canada Temperance Act presented a new phase on Saturday when the representative of a L. A. Wilson & Co., a well known wholesale liquor firm of Montreal, was charged with violating the act in this city. The offense was acknowledged and the usual fine with costs was paid.

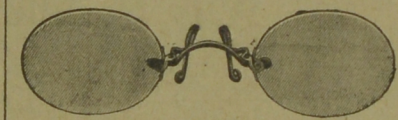
The section of the Canada Temperance Act under which the case was brought makes any person liable to prosecution who "sells, barbers of causes to be shipped," in any district in which the act is in force, liquor of any kind. The case is said to be the first of the kind which has ever occurred in Fredericton as there are a number of travellers of wholesale liquor firms who visit Fredericton from time to time it is possible that there may be similar prosecutions in the future.

The police made a record for speed in this case. Between the hours of 11.30 a.m. and 3 p.m., Saturday information was laid, a warrant issued and served, the case acknowledged and the fine imposed and paid.
