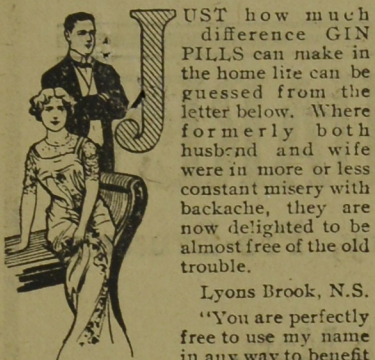

FIELD SECRETARY OF ALLIANCE MAKES SEIZURE

Found Liquor at Chatham Addressed To Fictitious Persons

(Chatham Gazette.)

Rev. R. H. Stavert of Harcourt, organizer of the Dominion Temperance Alliance, having received information that some liquor had arrived on the train Friday morning and was stored in the freight shed, with the aid of Harry Broecker of Chatham, searched the sheds and found several cases and a number of barrels there, consigned to local dealers under fictitious names, from Montreal and St. John firms.

When Mr. Stavert knew that the liquor was there he tried to get the police to procure a warrant for the seizure, but nothing was doing until Harry Broecker came on the scene; then they searched the building and found seven barrels and twelve cases of "wet goods."

The liquor was taken to the town hall, after freight charges had been paid, and stored there until some one will put up a claim for it. As no one is likely to do this it will most probably be destroyed.

One of the dealers who had heard that a seizure was about to be made, got his supply before the warrant and Broecker put in an appearance. This is the first seizure of the kind that has ever happened in Chatham.

MORE INQUIRIES ANSWERED BY THE GOVERNMENT

(Continued from page three.)

Q. 3. Who supplied paint, gasoline and other material necessary to do the work?

Answer. Accounts are in the hands of the Public Accounts Committee and can be seen by any member of this House.

Q. 4. Who paid for transportation of iron and machinery from one bridge to another?

Answer. Answered by No. 3.

Q. 5. What was the total commission paid the Concrete Construction, Limited, for work done upon the bridges?

Answer. Answered by No. 3. Hon. Mr. Flemming in answer to Mr. Pelletier's inquiry, said:

Q. 1. Has the department of railways and canals entered into a contract for the double subsidy for that portion of the Valley Railway between Andover and Grand Falls?

Answer. Although the government has not been officially advised by the department of railways and canals, we believe the subsidy contract with the Valley Railway between Andover and Grand Falls has not been entered into.

Q. 2. Has the Minister of Railways Railway from Andover to Grand approved of the location of the Valley Falls and from Gagetown to Rothesay?

Answer. The government believes the location between Andover and Grand Falls has not been approved and the location between Gagetown and Rothesay has been approved by the department of railways.

VALLEY RAILWAY ROUTE

Mr. Dugal's inquiry, said:

Hon. Mr. Flemming in answer to

Q. 1. Was any assurance given by premier or any member of the Government to a delegation from the parishes of Kingston No. 2 and Westfield No. 2 that it might be possible to divert the route of the Valley Railway so as to cross the Kennebecasis at or near Barlow's Bluff?

Answer. Various delegations have been heard from time to time in regard to possible locations of the St. John Valley Railway particularly from the Mistake to the City of St. John and a delegation from the parishes mentioned did make representations and investigations of all suggestions to the Government?

Q. 2. Did the engineers make any survey of this route? If so, what was their report?

Answer. The engineers of the railway company have made examinations and investigation of all suggested locations. Any information sent to the Government has been turned over to the railway company.

Q. 3. Is it true that J. Simeon Armstrong, C. E., made soundings recently upon the Kennebecasis at or near Gondola Point and discovered much less depth of water higher up the river?

Answer. The Government has no certain knowledge that Mr. J. Simeon Armstrong made soundings lately upon the Kennebecasis but from correspondence believes he may have done so.

Q. 4. If so, does this lessen the difficulty of being the Kennebecasis for railway purposes?

Answer. All information submitted by Mr. Armstrong has been turned over to the railway company.

Q. 5. What were the estimates of D. F. Maxwell.

(a) For bridging the Kennebecasis at Perry Point.

(b) For bridging the Kennebecasis at Gondola Point.

(c) For bridging the St. John River at the Mistake.

Answer. (a) None.

(b) \$1,317,625.

(c) \$526,000 bridging at St. John at Evendale.

Q. 6. What was the estimate of the Contracting Company for these bridges?

Answer. (a) \$146,000. (b) \$1,500,000. (c) \$991,400.

Q. 7. What is Mr. Mossarratt's estimate for a bridge across the St. John river?

Answer. Mr. Mossarratt estimates that the cost of a bridge across the River St. John at Dunham's wharf, would be \$2,063,756.20.

Q. 8. Has any detailed survey been made of the route between the Mistake and Westfield?

Q. 9. Has any detailed survey been made of the route between Westfield and St. John? How many miles? What is the estimate per mile; also estimate for bridge crossing St. John Harbour and for cost of right of way to west end of bridge and from east end of bridge to Courtney Bay?

Answer. The detailed survey has been made.

COST OF STATIONERY

Hon. Mr. Flemming in answer to Mr. Dugal's inquiry, said:

Q. 1. What was the total cost of the stationery, including not only paper by typewriter, supplies, pens, pencils, etc., supplied to all the government departments during the last fiscal year and what was the cost to watch?

Answer. The accounts are set out in detail in the public accounts of 1913 for each department.

Q. 2. From whom was this stationery purchased and what was the amount paid to each person, firm or company?

Answer. Answer same as idumber one.

Q. 3. How many typewriting machines were purchased by the government and for what departments during the fiscal years 1910-11, 1911-12, and 1912-13?

Answer. Answer same as number one.

Q. 4. From whom were the machines purchased, what did they cost and was any allowance made for the return of the machines in use?

Answer. Parties from whom machines were purchased with the cost appear in the Public Accounts and allowances were made, by the parties from whom new machines were purchased, for machines in use.

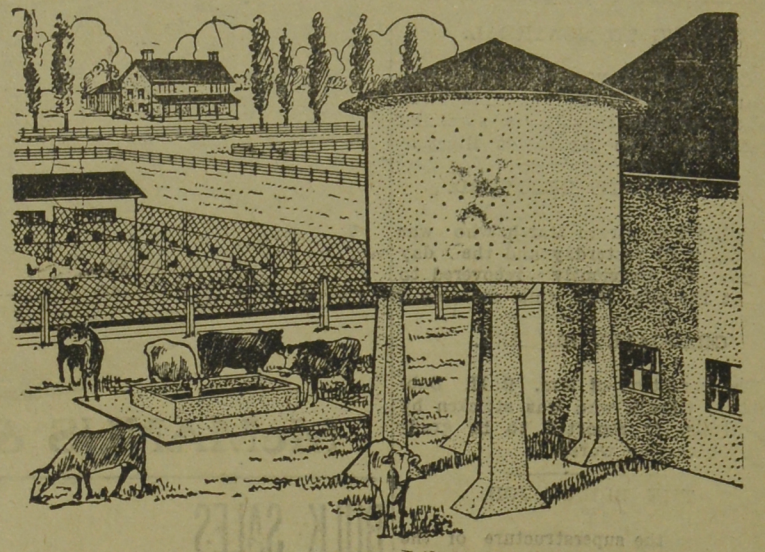
Q. 5. If so, what was the allowance, and if not where are the old machines?

Answer. Allowances for the old machine varies according to value of old machines.

Q. 6. What was the cost of stationery?

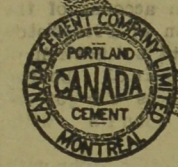
