VALUE OF TOURISTS TO THE DOMINION

Montreal, Jan. 20.—Before a large and enthusiastic audience in the club rooms of the Montreal Publicity Association, Mr. W. T. Robson, the ex. advertising agent of the Canadian Pacific Railway, urged that Canada's wonderful attractions for the tourist be advertised abroad. Among the many interesting statements he made were these: "Every tourist is a valuable asset to the country he visits. Many important Canadian industries owed their existence to the tourist," and among others he quoted Sir William Van Horne as his authority for stating that the enormous pulp and paper mills at Grand Mere existed today because of a fishing trip that millions of U.S. capital have been invested in Canada by men who came to this country on pleasure trips. That the average Canadian's interest in the tourist business was in proportion to his knowledge of his country's attractions. That Canada was the most beautiful country in the world and offered more to the summer visitor than any other land under the sun. There was no reason for our citizens to go to Maine when Nova Scotia, Cape Breton, Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick offered superior attractions. That \$50,000,000 per year was the value of the tourist business to Canada today and this business was only in its infancy. Our mountains were the finest in the world and Switzerland capitalized their more limited attractions to the extent of \$100,000,000 per year.

Canada desired the farmer and the land seeker but also wanted the world to know something of our wonderful scenery and sporting attractions in order to induce the wealthy residents of other lands to visit this country. He quoted a Boston paper as his authority for stating that this country needed an agency or bureau where authoritative information concerning the various attractions could be obtained independent of all affiliations, one which had no axes to grind and which would supply plain straightforward information, without color of prejudice, charged with the special duty of looking after the common interests of Canada as a whole, and not the individual hotel-keeper, resort proprietor, town, city, district, province or transportation company, a permanent organization working to secure every possible advantage for Canada, in order that this country may attain that pre-eminence which by nature was her right and to call into further action those important factors, which are most essential to the complete success of this movement.

Canadians are awakening to the vast importance of this movement, and that their apathy has allowed other countries to divert millions of money that might better have come to the picturesque spots along Canadian waters and to the delightful scenery of the Canadian inland.

Most enthusiastic and unusual interest was manifested in this subject by this meeting.

Notice of Legislation

At the next session of the Legislative Assembly of New Brunswick, the City of Fredericton will present for enactment, the following Bills:—

(1) To consolidate and amend the Acts relating to the election of Mayor and Aldermen for the said City, and so as to provide that the term of office for Aldermen shall be two years.

(2) To authorize the City Council to negotiate temporary loans with any Bank or other financial corporation.

(3) To authorize debentures for the extension and improvement of the water supply system of the said City.

(4) To enable the City Council to make a grant for publicity purposes.


