G. E. FAIRWEATHER
TO PREPARE PLANS
OF NEW SCHOOL

Eight Roomed Building to be Erected
on Smythe Street to Accommo-
date West End--Ready by
August

G. Ernest Fairweather of St. John, has been retained by the Building Committee of the School Board to prepare estimates and plans in connection with the new school building to be erected on Smythe street, between Charlotte and Saunders streets. Mr. Fairweather yesterday afternoon conferred with the Building Committee, which is composed of Dr. G. C. VanWart, chairman of the School Board; J. J. Weddall, Dr. W. C. Crockett and A. A. Sterling. The general idea of what is required in the new school was talked over.

THE NEW BUILDING.

The new school is to be of brick. It will have a basement and two stories. When fully occupied the school will have eight class-rooms but the intention is to have only six rooms completed, the remaining two being left in one so as to be used as an assembly hall. When the attendance should require it these class-rooms would be furnished and put in use. The sanitary equipment of the new building is to be located in the basement and all other fittings are to be modern.

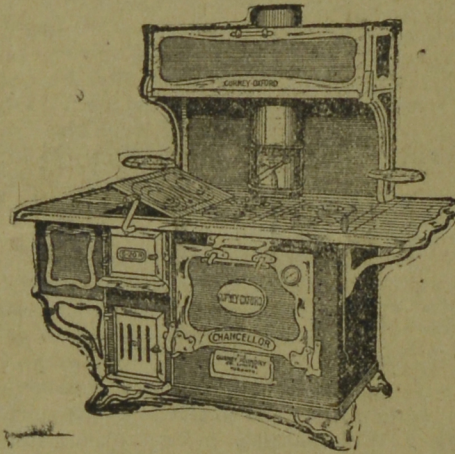
