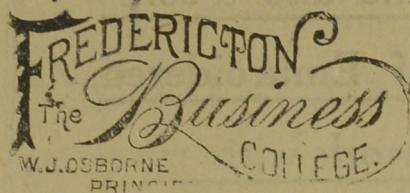

ENGLISH CONVICTS
WERE FOUND DEAD

London, Dec. 13—Two convicts,
aged 24 and 31 respectively, both of
whom were serving life sentence for
murder, were found dead in one cell
in Maidstone Prison today. Their
throats were cut with a rude knife
which the prisoners had improvised
out of a piece of iron while they
were working in the tinsmith shop
of the jail. The injuries on one of
the convicts were such that it is
thought they could not have been
self-inflicted and it is supposed that
the other man killed him at his
request.

Both men left messages in which
they said that as the Home Society
would give them no hope of a pardon
they would rather die than serve the
sentence.

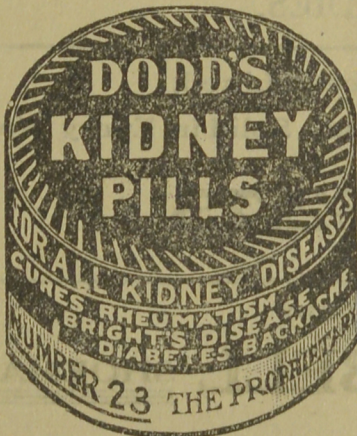

THE NEWS OF FREDERICTON
TWENTY-ONE YEARS AGO

(From The Weekly Herald of Decem-
ber 12, 1891.)

AT NORMAL SCHOOL—The stu-
dent teachers have been undergoing
examination at the Normal School
and now feel as if they could enjoy
the coming holidays, which begin on
the 18th.

MINING LICENSE—The Royal
Gazette of the 9th contains among
other notices of mining licenses that
of Alex. Gibson on McLean Brook
and Nashwaak and along the Dou-
glas-Stanley parish line.

BRIDGE BUILDING—Government
Engineer Beckwith, accompanied by
Thos. Colter, M.P.P., have located a
bridge across Bel River at Spring-
field. The work of building will be
proceeded with as rapidly as pos-
sible.

LARGE BEAR SKIN—Horatio
Grant, merchant of Canterbury, dis-
plays a large bear skin, one of the
largest in this province, being over
seven feet in length. The bear was
shot in the door-yard of a farm-
house. It is worth \$25.

RETIRED—William Cameron has
sold out his meat-business to his
clerk, Mr. Kelliher, and Mr. Peleg
Smith. During Mr. Cameron's long
career of thirty-two years as a but-
cher in this city, he has done busi-
ness in a straightforward way and
received a large patronage.

THE CANADA EASTERN—In Can-
ada Eastern affairs, Mr. A. McN.
Shaw of Moncton, takes Mr. Way-
cott's place as auditor. Conductor
McLoon will succeed Mr. Wetmore as
passenger and ticket agent while A.
Alcorn of Chatham, will become me-
chanical superintendent.

THE MAYORALTY—Despite the ur-
gent solicitation of his friends,
Mayor T. C. Allen has decided not
to offer for the mayoralty at the
coming election. Messrs. Harry
Beckwith and John Richards are men-
tioned as probable candidates. Dur-
ing Mayor Allen's incumbency civic
affairs have been well managed and
the meetings of the council have been
pleasant and profitable.

SKATING—Notwithstanding that
the ice was in a dangerous condition
on Sunday, many with a venturesome
spirit ran the risk of a ducking and
enjoyed themselves morning and af-
ternoon. Walter Jennings, clerk in
S. L. Morrison's grocery store, broke
the dull monotony of the afternoon
and the ice too, and after floundering
in the cold water a few minutes,
managed to pull himself out. Al-
though he had a narrow escape he
had a skate and thus figures in an
item for the papers.

BOARD OF TRADE—At the special
meeting of the council of the Board
of Trade, the vice-president, J. S.
Neill, reported that he had not re-
ceived information as to the cost of
a steamer suitable for traffic be-
tween this city and Woodstock but
thought a steel one could be procured
for a sum in the vicinity of
\$8,000 or \$10,000. A committee con-
sisting of J. S. Neill, A. H. F. Ran-
dolph and Secretary McCready was
appointed to deal with the necessity
for a fast freight and passenger line
of steamers between a Canadian port
and Great Britain.

zie Jarvis, sergeant, were married.
The Army was out in full force and
the citizens thronged the building
till there was not even standing room.

Lemont & Sons, were united in nup-
tial bonds by Rev. Mr. Crawley, pas-
tor of the Baptist Church. The bride

one of our favorites.

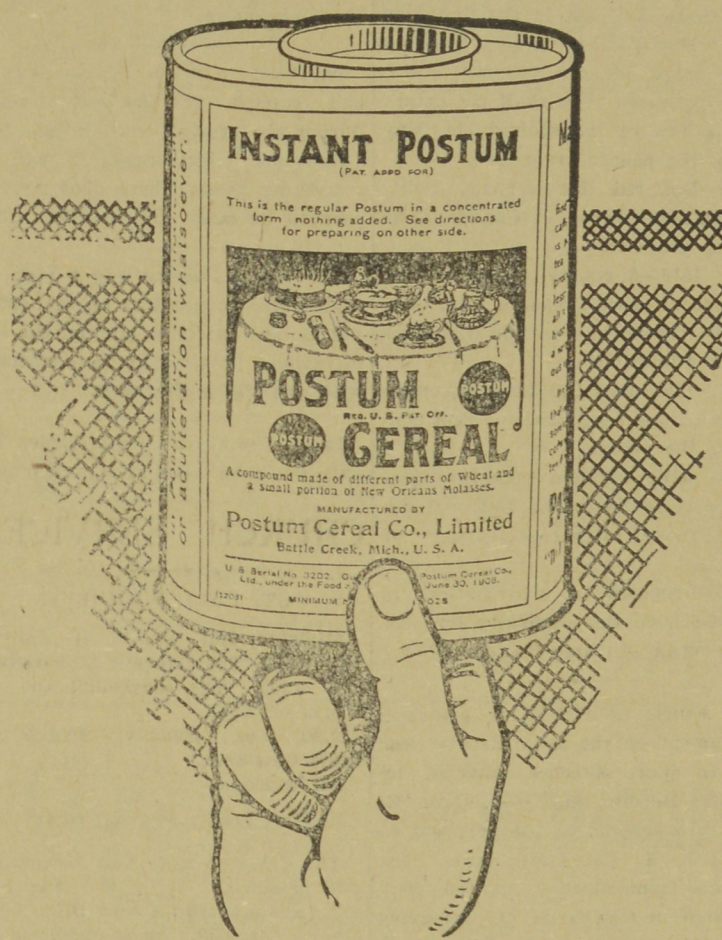

toes per bbl., 90 cents to \$1; tur-
nips per bbl., 50 cents; hay per ton

come of the late meeting of the St.
John Valley Railway at Woodstock
is quite an excitement in the river
