authorities that he wanted the case investigated.

IN JAIL SINCE JUNE.

He said that he had been held in jail on a charge of causing August Jacobson's death since June 12, 1912. "On August 22, 1911, I was going to Madawaska Lake," said Emelius. "When passing the Trone home I was told that the body of Jacobson was to be exhumed."

Q.—Did you make a statement about the rumors?

A.—If I can find who is making all the talk I shall have them punished according to law, I said.

Q.—Did you kill August Jacobson?

A.—No, sir. I did not.

Attorney General Pattangall then started cross examination.

Q.—Did you wear a duster that night?

A.—I always wore one.

Q.—What sort of hat did you wear Sunday?

A.—I generally wear a derby Sunday and presume I wore one that day.

Attorney General Pattangall then passed Emelius a letter which he identified as one written to Mrs. Wierens, asking her if she would make a statement in writing that he had come to her house between eleven and twelve o'clock Sunday night, June 12, 1911.

OFFERED A REWARD.

He told of offering \$800 reward for the arrest of the murderer of August Jacobson. He said the offer was signed by himself, his wife and Mrs. Jacobson.

"When I first saw the body the thought struck me that it looked like murder. I will be frank and say that I relied more on my own opinion than on the report of Dr. Lagarson."

Q.—Did you attend the coroner's inquest?

A.—Yes.

Q.—Did you employ detectives to investigate the case?

A.—Yes.

Q.—Did men from the Burns agency visit New Sweden and made some investigation?

Q.—Were you glad when Peter Youngren made statements about Jacobson, a relative of yours?

A.—I think the truth should be told about a man whether he is alive or dead.

Q.—Did it please you to hear the talk about a relative?

A.—It certainly did not.

Emelius testified that he had not heard Youngren say that Jacobson was a drunkard and a forger.

CONFERRED WITH CORONER RE-EXAMINATION OF BODY

Attorney General to be Consulted by Official—Expected That Necessary Permission Will be Given

Dr. B. M. Mullin, coroner, conferred with Mr. C. E. Scott, father of the late Murray A. Scott, this morning. The conference concerned the desire of relatives of the deceased to gain more information concerning the circumstances of his death. As mentioned in The Mail yesterday, they are of the opinion that some facts connected with his death have not been made clear and desire to have the remains which are interred at Douglas, exhumed and examined.

Coroner Mullin informed Mr. Scott that he would consult with the attorney general on the matter, which is one of importance. His answer will be known shortly. It is expected that permission to examine the body will be given and steps to do so will be taken Monday.

The deceased came to his death on Saturday last at Monument Lake, near Orient, Me. At the time drowning was alleged to be the cause of death but other rumors were circulated.
