MANAGER FOR CINCINNATI

Chicago Considered to Have Best of the Deal--Eight Players Involved in Trade--Johnny Evers one of Wise Guys of Baseball--Bridwell Goes From Braves to Chicago

TINKER TRADE IN DETAIL
Cincinnati gives Mitchell, Knisely, Humphreys, Corridon, Phelan for Tinker, Chipman, Loudermilk.

New York, Dec. 11--The National League magnates surprised everyone assembled here on baseball business today by adjourning at 5.30 after holding two short sessions, the one this afternoon lasting only two hours and Secretary John Heydler giving out the interesting inside information that the magnates had passed no legislation worthy of note.

Several important trades were put through and others started that will be consummated before the spring meeting. The long-talked-of trade between Chicago and Cincinnati was effected and Joe Tinker is now sure to become the next playing manager of the Cincinnati club.

Chicago gave up Tinker, pitcher Loudermilk and Chapman a youngster from the Topeka club, for Mitchell, Phelan, pitcher Humphreys, Knisely, an outfielder and Corridon, secured by Cincinnati from Detroit. It cost the Cincinnati club about \$7,000 to make the deal.

CHICAGO WON

There was not a manager or ball player present who does not figure that Chicago got all the better of the deal, and Johnnie Evers was congratulated on all sides and classed with the "wise guys" of baseball.

EVERS SECURES BRIDWELL
Before the Chicago club closed the deal it made sure of a good man for shortstop, getting Al Bridwell from the Boston Braves. Bridwell has recovered from his lameness so Manager Evers will have a tried out man for the berth left vacant by Tinker.

TO USE POLO GROUNDS

It seems to be well understood here that Frank Farrell's New York Highlanders will play at the Polo Grounds next season. The lease is up on his present grounds and he has done little of late on his new grounds near the end of Manhattan Island. The New York fans would like to see all the games played at the Polo Grounds.

Hugh McBrean and Peter Kelly of Boston were sent for and had a conference with Mrs. Britton today at the Waldorf and both returned to Boston tonight. 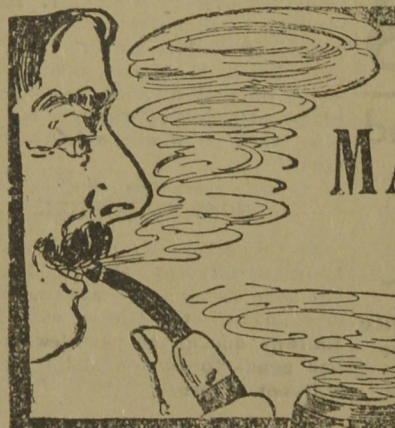
