THREE DIVORCE CASES WERE HEARD THIS MORNING

Judgements to be Given This Afternoon--St. John Policemen on Stand This Morning--Heavy Docket for Court

The Divorce Court opened its July term here this morning, Mr. Justice McKeown presiding. The docket was a record one for size, fourteen cases being on the list, three cases standing for judgment, two cases remaining unfinished and nine cases being filed for this term.

Among the barristers from outside Fredericton who were present were T. T. Goodwin, G. Earle Logan, A. E. Pearson, W. D. Turner, M. L. Hayward, H. J. Smith, E. C. Weyman and others.

Sir F. E. Barker and Dr. T. C. Allen were also present.

His Honor announced that judgment would be delivered at three o'clock this afternoon in the cases standing for judgment.

On motion the case of Bugless vs Bugless and the case of Wheaton vs Wheaton were stood over till the next term. The cases of Appleby vs Appleby and Melanson vs Melanson are to be heard at St. John at 11 a.m. August 14, 1914. The case of Douthright vs Douthright, Parlee vs Parlee and Bulyea vs Bulyea are to be heard here August 14.

The cases of Sarah Frances Ross vs Robert Ross and Richard Burhoe vs Annie Burhoe, both of which arise from a St. John police court case, were heard. The witnesses were Deputy Provincial Secretary Tibbitts, Mrs. Ross, Mr. Burhoe, Police Sergt. Kilpatrick and Patrolman Briggs of the St. John police, and C. H. Ferguson. Court considers.

WM. F. GRACE BURNED SEVERELY BY OIL EXPLOSION LAST NIGHT

Lubricating Oil on Stove Set Fire to Woodwork of Barber-shop--Three Physicians in Attendance Last Night

William F. Grace, barber, had a narrow escape from death last night at his barber-shop, Regent street, when he was severely burned by an explosion of oil, which also set fire to the woodwork of the rear part of the shop. Today his condition is reported to be fairly good, although he is suffering much pain. He is severely burned about the face and neck and his hands are also burned. He will be confined to his home for several weeks.

Mr. Grace was alone in the shop last night when the accident occurred. He was cleaning his bicycle and had a can of lubricating-oil on the stove. This oil exploded, setting fire to the woodwork of the little room in which the stove is situated. Mr. Grace attempted to put out the fire, which was caused by the explosion and received the burns mentioned. He was able to make his way to Hunt & MacDonald's drug-store, where medical aid was secured and his injuries attended to. In the meantime members of the Fredericton Fire Department, who were holding a meeting in the Labor Council Rooms above the barber-shop, became aware of the accident through the odor of smoke. They searched the building and located the fire, which had damaged the woodwork of the room and also the screen in the open window facing the alley.

Last night three physicians were in attendance on Mr. Grace. Today he is reported to be improving.

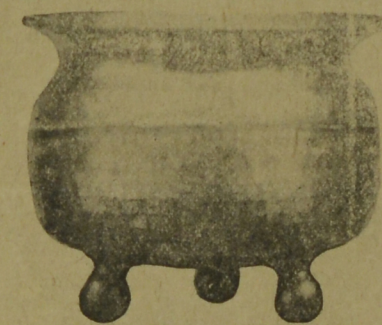
