COMPANY KNOWS  
NOTHING OF TROUBLE  
WITH CORBETTS

Chief Engineer Wass Says Order For  
Work on Gagetown-St. John Section  
is Given---Work Will be  
Done

"The company knows of no trouble," said S. E. Wass, chief engineer for the St. John & Quebec Railway Company, when asked today concerning a published statement of H. A. Corbett to the effect that James H. Corbett, Incorporated, would not start construction of the Gagetown-St. John section of the railway until certain of the route to be followed. "The statement of Mr. Ross Thompson published by The Mail on Friday, is the company's last word in the matter. Mr. Corbett looked over the ground and as far as we know, will proceed with the construction."

There have been rumors current of trouble between the Corbett company and the railway. The contract for the Gagetown-St. John section was signed by the Corbett company at the time the contracts for the other sections were given. According to report, the price agreed upon was considerably higher than that given contractors on other sections. At that time the Corbett company tendered at a low rate for all the sections and as a result of their low figure, the contracts to the Hibbard Company and Kennedy & McDonald were taken at figures much lower than otherwise would have been the case. For the Gagetown-St. John section, however, the Corbett company were given the contract at a higher figure. Recent reports stated that there was friction between the

RISING WATER

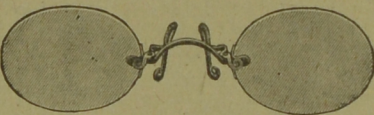
Freshet of 1914 Will Make Much  
Trouble---No Sign of any Check  
---Snow Storm at Van Buren  
This Morning

The new concrete wharf built by the Dominion Public Works Department at Phoenix Square is now out of commission being partially covered by the rising river and the high-water wharf at the foot of Regent Street which was specially built up by the City some years ago is in a similar condition. Since noon Sunday the river rose more than six inches and there is no prospect of the freshet subsiding.

A report received this morning from Van Buren Me., by the St. John River Log Driving Company stated that the water was rising and logs running thickly. The temperature was low, however, registering forty degrees and there was a snow storm this morning. Driving prospects are good everywhere. No difficulty is anticipated with the corporation drivers on the main river.

Along the Fredericton water-front conditions are such as to cause anxiety and cause fear of a repetition of the conditions of 1887 in which the record freshet Goods in some warehouses already reached by the water have been placed on staging are removed. Wharves are all under water except those at the highway bridge which now are furnishing accommodation to steamers, tugs and other craft. A very little further rise will cover parts of Campbell Street.

The funeral of the late Mrs. David Sansom, formerly of St. Mary's, took place at Campbellton Sunday. The deceased passed away on Friday last after a lengthy illness. Three children and her husband survive.

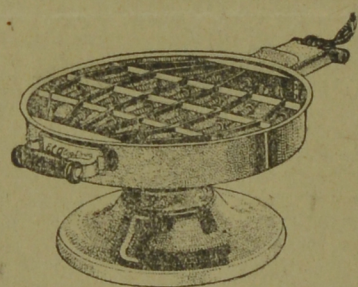

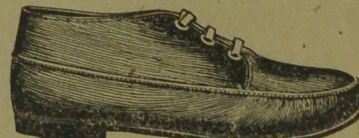
