HE RAN FOURTH.

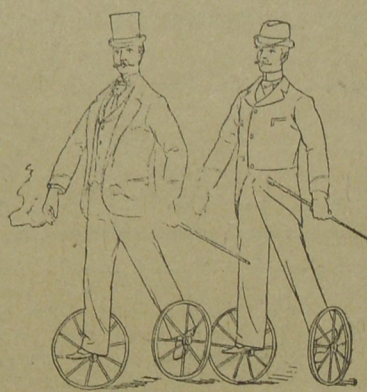

BRAKEMAN WAS SCALDED WHEN ENGINE LEFT RAILS

Ernest Logan Painfully Burnt in Accident When I. R. C. Freight train Was Derailed Yesterday at Goodspeed's Bluff

Ernest Logan, son of Conductor A. E. Logan of Landsdowne Street, was very painfully injured late yesterday afternoon when the engine of the I.R.C. freight train bound for this city and in charge of Conductor A. O. T. Crookshank left the rails on the curve at Goodspeed's Bluff. The engine went over an embankment and fell about twenty feet turning completely over and landing bottom up.

Driver John Cameron and Fireman Guy Mathews who were in the engine cab got clear of the engine as it fell, but Logan who was forward brakeman had his foot caught and was carried over with it. The steam-pipes of the engine was broken and he was enveloped in a cloud of steam which scalded him badly about the head, chest and arms.

The other members of the train crew extricated Logan from his position and he walked to Bertrand Goodspeed's house about two hundred yards away although suffering much from his injuries. From Mr. Goodspeed's he was driven to Marysville and from that town came to Fredericton by the I.R.C. suburban train.
