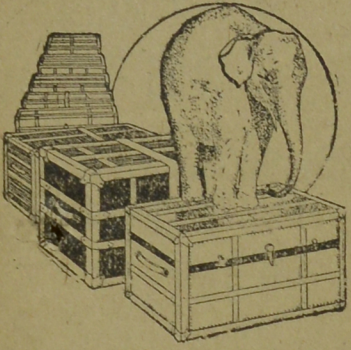

matter of \$600,000 or \$700,000. Our  
object is to show where this money  
went. The information asked for is a  
matter of evidence. If I were to give  
all my suspicions I might not get all  
my witnesses here. If my friend mere-  
ly wants additional time that is a  
matter for the commission to deal  
with."

Mr. Teed—"I see no difference be-  
tween the two cases. In the one it is  
charged that money was unlawfully  
extorted and in the other that it was  
unlawfully diverted. Surely this is  
not a fishing expedition. I think we  
are entitled to the information."

Mr. Carvell—"Mr. Clarke, the act-  
ing premier, asked Mr. Dugal for  
much of this information and Mr.  
Dugal replied that he should not be  
compelled to furnish it. The acting  
premier intimated that the govern-  
ment could not see their way clear to  
appoint a committee unless more in-  
formation was forthcoming. Mr. Du-  
gal again protested but furnished  
some information and afterwards was  
sorry that he had done so. He told  
the government that James H. Cor-  
bett & Son had paid \$10,000 to Prem-  
ier Fleming and that Scott & Kel-  
ly had paid \$1,500 to Hon. H. F. Mc-  
Leod. This was sufficient and steps  
were taken for the appointment of a  
commission."

"The object of this inquiry is not  
to throw mud but to get to the bot-  
tom of the financial affairs of this  
railway, one of the most important  
financial matters ever undertaken by  
the provincial government. Mr. Du-  
gal has charged that the company has  
been paid at the rate of \$28,000 a mile  
—\$25,000 in guaranteed bonds and  
\$3,000 in subsidies—he says that the  
road will not cost more than this  
amount; that the company owes the  
contractors about \$200,000 and that  
it will take \$300,000 to complete the  
road. Therefore \$800,000 has been  
taken out and diverted from its prop-  
er purpose and we want to learn  
what has been done with this money."

"The real object of the inquiry is  
not to cast aspersions upon any per-  
son but to inquire into the financial  
affairs of the company. Mr. Dugal  
claims that the second grant to the  
company was not necessary and this  
he proposes to show. We intend to  
show that the money has not been  
put into the road and if we can go  
further and show where it did go, so  
much the better. I do not think that  
we should furnish this information at  
this stage."

Dr. Wallace supported Mr. Car-  
vell's contention and the chairman  
announced that the commission would  
take the matter into consideration  
and would give their decision at the  
next meeting.

The commission then adjourned un-  
til Tuesday, June 16, at ten o'clock.

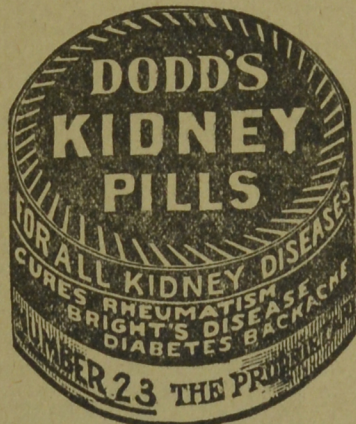

DR. G. F. McNALLY

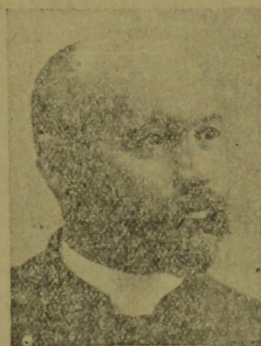
The Governor General's Bronze  
Medal for professional work among  
Second Class students was presented  
to Miss Matilda E. Fraser of Chip-  
man by Dr. G. F. McNally, principal  
of the Normal School at Camrose,  
Alta.

Dr. McNally said that he was pleas-  
ed to support the remarks made by  
Dr. Bridges to the effect that the  
young men and women should devote  
themselves to educational work in  
New Brunswick. If the young ladies  
remained here five years there would  
be little opportunity of getting them  
out West. The young men at the end  
of that period would find ample  
opportunities in their native prov-  
ince. To Miss Fraser he said he hoped  
her success was merely the first of her  
career in education.

Rev. Dr. G. M. Campbell, principal  
of Mt. Allison Ladies' College was  
then introduced as the speaker of the  
occasion. Dr. Campbell expressed his  
pleasure on account of the oppor-  
tunity afforded him. He reminded his  
hearers that there were many de-  
ments which would enter into the  
lives of the members of the gradu-  
ating class.

The members of the Normal School  
staff had not spared themselves in  
their efforts to fit the members of the  
class for their careers. As citizens  
of a great and growing country he  
had one word to say to them, one  
principle to which to call their atten-  
tion—"Nationality is the secret of  
Empire and counts for more than  
Empire."

This was a most critical period in  
the history of the Dominion. There  
was too great a tendency to devote  
all energies to the accumulation of  
wealth.

Dr. Campbell issued a warning  
against scattering energies and en-  
deavors over too great a field. Na-  
s had made that error. They  
often had brought wide regions un-  
der their flags only to forget what  
their nationality stood for. Spain  
was a noted example of such a sit-  
uation so it was he said—"Nationality  
is greater than Empire."

At the present time Canadians were  
being brought to think imperially  
in the future, would the historian  
have to say that Canadians had  
forgotten character and nationality.

### TRUE NATIONALITY

The nation was not to be built  
upon battle-fields or gold-fields—it  
was to be built in the home, the  
school, the university and on the  
principles of economy, industry and  
temperance.
