THE NEW CONCRETE CITY A HOME FOR WORKINGMEN

Every one of the twenty double concrete houses in Concrete City, the model village built by the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Coal Company near Nanticoke, Pa., is occupied. A park, which is surrounded by houses, alone remains to be completed.

The houses are two-story structures fifty by twenty-five feet, built of concrete, with flat roofs and dark green trimmings. They are modeled in one piece, after the idea of Thomas A. Edison, but under another man's patent and adaptation, according to the Coal and Coke Operator. Floors, walls, roofs, stairways and even sinks and wash-basins are made in a mold of "poured" concrete. They are so constructed that on occasion the furniture may be all removed and the entire house thoroughly washed out with a hose.

Each house contains seven rooms and has a stationary wash-tub, a buttery and a dry cellar. Wooden strips are embodied in the floors, so that carpets may be tacked down. Below the French windows, opening outward, window-boxes for flowers are set in the walls. There are also boxes for flowers set in the sides of the front steps, above which small overhanging roofs are supported by chains.

There is ample space behind each house for a truck garden and prizes will be given for the best kept grounds. A complete sewage system has been installed, concrete walks surround and will intersect the central square and the whole place is surrounded by a stout wire fence. The effect of the rectangle of the houses, with their little red chimneys and trim lawns in "apple pie" order, is said to be most effective.

MAY DECIDE ON A FIXED DATE FOR EASTER

Brussels, March 25.—A proposal to have the world adopt a fixed date for Easter will be discussed and acted upon at the biennial meeting of the International Congress of Chambers of Commerce which is to meet in Paris next June. Such is the announcement made by the permanent committee of the Congress, which met in Brussels today to approve the programme prepared for the Paris meeting.

The fact that the variable date for Easter causes much embarrassment and loss in certain lines of trade is responsible for the movement to have the festival celebrated on a fixed date it is suggested by the supporters of the movement that the fixed date could be brought about by regulating Easter by the sun instead of the moon.

The programme prepared for the meeting of the Congress shows that numerous other important subjects will be brought up for consideration. Postal money orders and checks, bills of lading for steam navigation, insurance policies in international traffic, dock warrants, arbitral procedure, and the utility of the proposed international action regarding unfair competition are among the questions that will receive attention.

A possible source of discussion relative to competition may be the operations of great combinations such as the Standard and Russian oil companies, the German syndicate which controls the trade in potash and other concerns whose field include the world. The British system of marine insurance, evolved by centuries of experience, will be closely examined for models to improve the phraseology of policies.

The programme as prepared by the committee indicates that American thought and practice have largely influenced conditions under which trade and commerce are carried on. The United States and Great Britain, for example, have made the largest use of the postal money order and the bank check, and the Congress may consider plans for broadening the service rendered by both and making them better understood. The need of uniformity, or at least a better understanding, is illustrated by the fact that under sixteen of The Hague convention the death of a maker of a check has no influence upon the validity of the check, whereas according to English law the check becomes void on the death of the signer.

One object of the coming meeting will be to constitute the Congress an active influence between the biennial meetings. The plans in this direction will be framed along the lines of the work accomplished by the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, which is able to back up its resolutions with a permanent organization.

It is expected that the commerce and trade bodies of America will take an important part in the sessions in Paris. The international Congress and its work are well understood in the United States, since the last meeting of the organization was held in Boston in 1912. It is expected that the coming meeting will be attended by a large delegation of representative American manufacturers and business men.

The French Government, in co-operation with the business organizations of France, is preparing for the elaborate entertainment of the visitors. The delegates from abroad will be regarded as the guests of the Republic, and the two weeks following the sessions of the Congress will be given up to more or less formal visits at Lyons, Grenoble, Valence, Dijon and other places of historic interest and industrial importance. Excursions also will be arranged to point in Italy, Switzerland, Germany and other countries.

A WEEK TO WATCH THE FLEMMING GOVT.

(St. John Telegraph.)

That little journey Hon. Mr. Flemming once made in the company of Sir William Van Horne—is the fruit of it to be a Valley railroad beginning at one point on the C.P.R. and ending at another point on the C.P.R.?

Not many months ago Hon. Mr. Flemming said in a speech that the Valley Railway would be completed to St. John before the end of 1915. Would he say so today? What is the route below Georgetown and above Centreville? Is the Grand Trunk Pacific going to use the Valley road—and when? What has become of the money already provided for the railway? How much more will finish it? If the company gets into the treasury for a couple of millions this year what guarantee is there that they will not come back for more?

It is too much to believe that the legislature will further mortgage the public credit unless these questions are answered definitely and satisfactorily. The conflicting utterances of Mr. Flemming and his followers some time ago bred public doubt and distrust concerning this whole enterprise. Of late the lack of definite statements as to the route, the cost, the time of completion and the intentions of the Grand Trunk Pacific with respect to the Valley line have greatly increased public uneasiness and suspicions.

This week or next the future of the enterprise will be settled at Fredericton. Are the people of St. John and other communities going to take a hand now and safeguard their interests, or are they going to let the matter go by default. So far as St. John is concerned, it is scarcely to be expected that the mayor and commissioners and the board of trade will be silent and inactive. There is too much at stake. Moreover, there is no time to lose.
