## TUPPER-McBRIDE FEUD STILL EXISTS

(Halifax Chronicle)

The feud between Sir Richard McBride, the Conservative Premier of British Columbia and Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper, which developed into a rupture during the last Provincial election in that Province has not been healed. At that time Sir Hibbert expressed his opinion of Premier McBride and his railway policy in somewhat vigorous terms and openly campaigned against the McBride Government in that election. The result of this quarrel was that Sir Hibbert was unable to secure a Conservative nomination for the Federal House in British Columbia and the fact that he has remained so long out of public life is in all probability due to the McBride influence, which has been used against him locally and with the Tory Party leaders at Ottawa.

Dir Hibbert on his side, now makes it known to the public, at large that he has not changed his opinion of Mr. McBride or his railway policy. Sir Richard is putting through the British Columbia Legislature a measure of further aid for the Canadian northern railway in that Province and Sir Hibbert Tupper's opinion of the deal is volunteered in the following address to the Vancouver News-Advertiser on February 26th.

### C. N. RAILWAY GUARANTEE.

To the Editor of the News-Advertiser: Sir,—Some reference was made in the press to myself as well as to clients of mine re False Creek arbitration in connection with the present Bill for further aid to the Canadian Northern Railway. It is only fair to my clients to say that they gave me no instructions in this matter and have nothing to do with my views on the subject. Learning that certain Conservatives proposed to meet and consider the situation I attended this meeting by request. Finding they met as supporters of the McBride-Bowser combination I at once said I was an 'out-and-out' opponent of their Canadian Northern policy from the start and should therefore be eliminated from any meeting of their supporters. Subsequently I believe these gentlemen met with the local Conservative organization and acted without reference to me or my views. I believed at the last general election that the railway policy of the Local Government would involve our Province in liabilities, wholly unwarranted. The addition to these liabilities at the present juncture is in my opinion, but a further throw of desperate gamblers who are unfortunately gambling with money not their own. It is somewhat significant that just at the moment when the Borden Government is trying to line up its recalcitrant followers in support of a similar measure of thirty-five million dollar bond guarantee for the Canadian Northern, Sir Hibbert should have taken occasion to inform the public what he thinks of Premier McBride and his allies of the Canadian Northern Railway. It seems that Sir Hibbert is out of touch with the methods and policies of the party, of which he was once such a conspicuous leader. His reference to a "further throw of desperate gamblers,—who are unfortunately gambling with money not their own," is very suggestive, to say the least.

## GRAND TRUNK PACIFIC NOT ASKING MORE AID

Montreal, March 23—Reports published in Canada and the United States that the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company is asking for further assistance from the Canadian government are not correct, according to an official statement given out to the newspapers recently.

The statement reads: "The government in 1903, when the Grand Trunk Pacific-Transcontinental contract was entered into, among other things agreed to guarantee the company's bonds for \$13,000 per mile on the prairie section and 75 per cent of the cost of the mountain section, and in 1905 took powers by act of parliament to guarantee £14,000,000 for that purpose.

"This, it is found, is not sufficient to complete the line, and we have suggested to the government the advisability of taking further powers at the present session to enable them to carry out their part of the contract.

"The Grand Trunk Pacific has provided its proportion of the additional cost and, therefore, does not need at this time to ask for further assistance, as has been suggested in recent newspaper articles."

## BLIND HYMN WRITER BEGINS 95TH YEAR

Bridgeport, Conn., March 24—Fanny Crosby, the famous blind hymn writer, entered upon her ninety-fifth year today, having been born March 24, 1820. Miss Crosby makes her home with a niece in this city. This afternoon a reception was given in her honor by the members of the Fanny Crosby Circle of King's Daughters. From all parts of the country hundreds of felicitous messages arrived during the day congratulating the famous hymn writer on her birthday.

Miss Crosby, whose full name is Frances Jane Crosby Van Alstyne, has been by far the most prolific and meritorious writer of hymns of the present age, having written more than five thousand, of which many have won universal popularity.

She has been totally blind from her infancy. At the age of fifteen she was sent to the Institute for the Blind in New York City to be educated. She made such rapid progress in all branches that a few years later she was appointed a teacher in the institution. She remained there about ten years.

Even during the earlier student days Miss Crosby had shown considerable ability as a writer of verse and later several volumes of her poems were published. One of her poems which first attracted public attention was written by her in welcome to Henry Clay on the occasion of a visit of the celebrated statesman to New York.

Miss Crosby's first songs were of a secular nature and it was not until she had reached the age of forty-five that she wrote her first hymn. Born with great poetical gifts and filled with ardent religious fervor, she put her whole soul into her hymns and it is not surprising that their simplicity, tender sentiment and melodious beauty have won world-wide popularity.

The most popular among the thousands of Miss Crosby's hymns undoubtedly are "Safe in the Arms of Jesus," "Jesus, Keep Me Near the Cross," and "Jesus the Water of Life Will Give." Two of her secular songs which were vastly popular in their day were "Hazel Dell" and "There's Music in the Air."

Many stories have been told to illustrate the facility with which Miss Crosby did her work of composition. Once, while a pupil at the Institution for the Blind, she was required to write some lines of blank verse. She neglected the task until her teacher reminded her and told her she would not get her dinner until she had written the verses. In less than an hour Miss Crosby had commenced and completed the poem.

"Safe in the Arms of Jesus," which is probably the most popular of her hymns, was composed by her while W. H. Doane, who had written the music for many of her hymns, was waiting to take a train. He was sitting at the piano, softly playing the music for which he wished her to find words and in twenty minutes the famous hymn was completed.

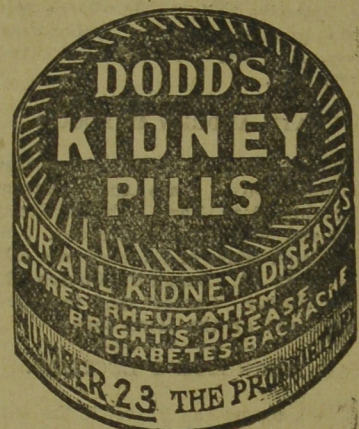

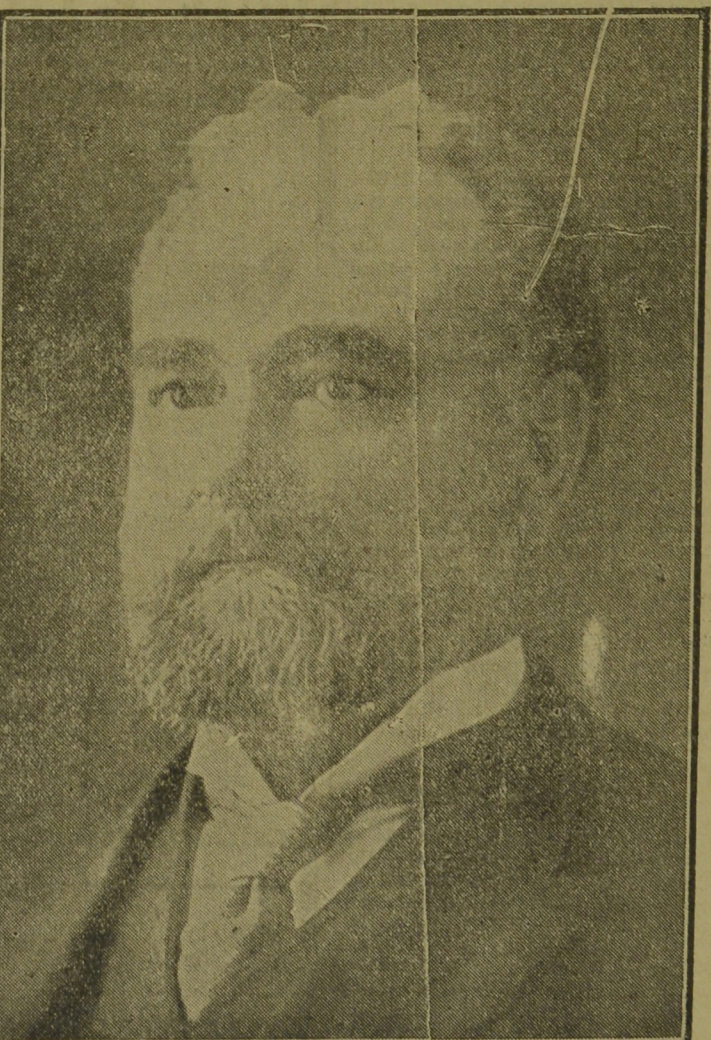
