Chief of Police to be Informed of Them--Executive to Make Appointment of Agent for Society

The Fredericton Branch of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty, met last night at the Board of Trade rooms, President L. C. Macnutt in the chair. The list of membership, already large was further increased by the addition of several members. The total membership is now one hundred and five which is large when it is considered that the reorganization of the society was undertaken only a few weeks ago.

Mrs. L. C. Macnutt was admitted to life-membership on the payment of the customary fee.

TO APPOINT AGENT

There was some discussion concerning the appointment of an agent for the society and it was decided that such an official should be appointed. The executive was not instructed to deal with the matter. The appointment will be made within a few days.

RETURNED BY ACCLAMATION




