MR. CROCKET'S OPPORTUNITY

Mr. O. S. Crocket, M. P. for York, made a big noise in Parliament in 1907, because the Liberal government of the day appointed Hon. John Costigan and Mr. Daniel Gilmore, to the Senate as representatives of New Brunswick. He claimed that Mr. Costigan was a resident of Ottawa and Mr. Gilmore a resident of Montreal, and that their elevation to the Senate was a gross violation of the British North America Act and an invasion of the rights of the province. Here are his own words as recorded in the official debates:

"Neither the Hon. John Costigan nor Mr. Daniel Gilmore is a resident of the Province of New Brunswick, and I submit to the House that the government has openly violated both the letter and spirit of the B.N.A. Act in that regard. There can be no question that one of the essential qualifications for appointment to the Senate is that the person appointed must be a resident of the province for which he is appointed. Section 23 of the B.N.A. Act lays down the qualifications necessary for appointment to the Senate of Canada and that section sets forth:—

1. That the appointee shall be of the full age of 30 years.
2. That he shall be a British subject.
3. That he shall be seized of freehold or real estate in the province for which he is appointed to the value of \$4000 over and above all rents, dues, debts, charges, mortgages and encumbrances.

4. His real and personal property shall be together worth \$4000 over and above his debts and liabilities.
And this is the particular sub-section of the B.N.A. Act which I purpose to discuss:—

5. He shall be a resident of the province for which he is appointed.
"No one," said Mr. Crocket "can read that section without seeing that it is the clear and plain intention of the B.N.A. Act that no one shall be appointed to the Senate from any province unless his chief interests and his residence are within that province."

On Wednesday Ottawa despatches made the announcement that the Borden Government has appointed Mr. Nathaniel Curry to the Senate as a representative of the province of Nova Scotia. Now Mr. Curry is the president of the Canada Car Foundry Company and has for several years been a resident of the city of Montreal where his chief interests are located. He formerly resided at Amherst, N.S., and has a summer cottage near that place. On of the conditions of his appointment to the presidency of the Canada Car Foundry Company was that he should make his headquarters at Montreal. The arguments which Mr. Crocket urged against the appointment of Messrs Costigan and Gilmore if they were sound, are applicable to the case of Senator Curry. Mr. Crocket the carping critic in 1907, found it necessary to raise his voice in protest against the appointment of Messrs Gilmore and Costigan on the ground that they were non-residents. Will Mr. Crocket the servile follower of the government of 1912, take the same course?

The transportation committee of the Board of Trade should get after the I. C. R. authorities and see if some effort cannot be made to have the time table for the new transcontinental railway conform to that of the Canada Eastern branch. In preparing the time table not the slightest regard appears to have been paid to the interests of Fredericton. For instance a person wishing to travel from this city to Plaster Rock or Edmundston by the new line would have to leave here by the freight at five o'clock in the morning. Two hours later he would be dropped at McGivney Junction and he would have a five hours wait there for the Moncton train. A person coming from an up river point, would leave home in the morning and reach McGivney in time to miss the freight train coming to this city, and would be compelled to remain over for the express next day. Mighty good care has been taken that the new road will not compete with the C. P. R. for passenger traffic.

Discussing the appointment of Mr. Curry to the senate the Halifax Chronicle says:

"Mr. Nathaniel Curry, formerly of Amherst, but now resident in Montreal, has been best known in Nova Scotia as head of the Rhodes-Curry Car Company lately merged in the Canada Car Company. Mr. Curry has amassed great wealth and is one of Canada's captains of industry. As President of the Manufacturers Association last year he rendered yeoman service to the Tory party and he now has the satisfaction of receiving his reward. It is to be regretted that this appointment could not have been given to a resident of Nova Scotia, but the exigencies of politics evidently demanded otherwise."

"To appoint men to office as a reward for party service in the oft expressed opinion of Hon. R. L. Borden, is a gross breach of a solemn public trust." It is to be presumed then that Mr. William Dennis of the Halifax Herald owes his appointment to the Senate to his statesmanlike qualities. All the same there are probably a few hundred thousand people in Nova Scotia who will entertain the idea that it came as a reward for party service.

Recent appointments to the Canadian Senate include Mr. Nathaniel Curry, president of the Canada Car and Foundry Company, and ex-premier of the Manufacturer's Association, and Mr. Harry Corby, whisky distiller. Under Tory rule the "big interests" are certainly being well looked after

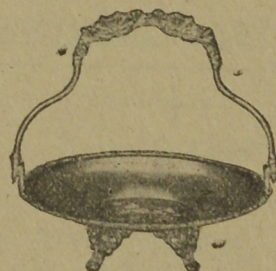
