"Honorable gentlemen of the Sen-
ate:—

"Gentlemen of the House of Com-
mons:—

"I invite your earnest consideration
of the subjects to which I have al-
luded, and I invoke the blessings of
Divine Providence upon your delibera-
tions."

LIBERALS READY.

Liberal members of parliament,
headed by the 'old chief, are ready
for a fighting session and the attack
will begin promptly with the debate
on the address in reply to the speech
from the throne. The attack will be
kept up with vigor, in fact with even
greater vigor than last session, and
prorogation is not expected until
June.

Since the close of last session three
members of the government side,
Messrs. Goodever, Lennox and Stap-
les, have been appointed to positions
of emolument under the crown, and
Hon. F. D. Monk has left the govern-
ment and will sit at a private
member as a dash-mate of Hon. John
Haggart. One member has died, Ed-
ward Kidd of Carleton. Four new
faces will be seen, Messrs.
Greene (Kootenay), Morrison (Mac-
donald), Boyd (South Simcoe) and
Garland (Carleton).

The paramount question at the
opening of the session will, of course,
be the government's proposals for an
emergency contribution to the im-
perial navy. It is understood that a
cash grant of \$30,000,000 is contem-
plated with subsidiary proposals for
an imperial defence council, the
strengthening of the naval bases at
Halifax and Esquimaux and provision
for subsidized trans-Atlantic steam-
ers of the convertible cruiser type.

The government's announcement of
its policy is not likely to be brought
down for a week or so yet, pending
the conclusion of the debate on the
address which will probably last for
some days, and which will deal with
questions other than naval defence.

The preliminary debate will, how-
ever, serve to emphasize the contin-
ued covert alliance between the Na-
tionalists and the Conservatives, de-
spite the apparent break through the
retirement of Hon. F. D. Monk. In
this connection it is worth noting
that Dr. Paquette, Nationalist mem-
ber for L'Islet, today notified Prem-
ier Borden that he was still willing
to serve as chief ministerial whip
for Quebec.

It is probable that the first steps
will be taken this session looking to
the deepening of the whole St. Law-
rence canal system to a depth of
twenty-five feet, thus providing a
continuous deep waterway from the
seaboard to the head of the Lakes.

The question of the government
operation of the National Transcon-
tinental Railway and of giving run-
ning rights to the C.N.R. or the In-
tercolonial Railway, as already fore-
casted, will also be one of the big
matters of debate this session.

It is not expected that a redistri-
bution bill will be passed this ses-
sion. A measure for redistribution
may be introduced but the govern-
ment has no intention of pressing it
this session, preferring to leave it
over until next year, thus avoiding
any danger of being forced to go to
the country without running their
full lease of office.

On the tariff question, it is not
expected that any radical changes
will be proposed by the government
at present, excepting possibly in the
matter of the steel and iron and the
cement duties which will be submit-
ted to a caucus for early considera-
tion.

NO CIVIL SERVICE REFORM
LIKELY.

Premier Borden's promise of reform
in the civil service by placing the
outside service on a permanent basis
and removing the evils of political
patronage is not likely to be realized
this session, pending a further
widening of the axe and the filling up
of the vacancies by Conservative ap-
pointments. A few minor reforms
may be inaugurated but little tan-
gible result is expected from the two
civil service commissions so far
appointed.

thousands of sick in this camp
many of them lying on the open
ground and great numbers support-
ing their backs against the houses
bordering the open fields, most of
which are deserted.

London, Nov. 20—The war has
shifted for a time from the field of
arms to that of diplomacy. It may
be that the war is near to an end.
Plenipotentiaries for the belligerent
powers will meet tomorrow at the
village of Hademkeul, a few miles
outside the capital for a preliminary
discussion of the terms of an armis-
tice.

In the meantime the Turkish, Bul-
garian and Servian commanders have
ordered a cessation of hostilities, al-
though cannonading which Nazim
Pasha reports as unimportant oc-
curred this morning.

The sweeping terms which the al-
lies were said to have demanded yester-
day as a basis for the armistice
appear not to have been advanced,
but it is almost certain that an
armistice will be on the basis of
the Balkan states holding all the
conquered territory until a permanent
treaty of peace is signed.

What vestiges of his former power
they are prepared to concede the
Turk depends largely upon two fac-
tors: The strength and supplies of
the allied armies threatening the
gates of Constantinople, and the ex-
tent to which the cholera spectre
has embarrassed their plans.

It is certain that great transport
difficulties hamper the Bulgarian
army on account of the distance from
its base, and the rough roads. The
cholera is counted on by the Turks
to weaken the Bulgarian ambition to
a triumphant march into the capital
and the celebration of mass in St.
Sophia.

WILL FIGHT WHILE TALKING PEACE

Constantinople, Nov. 20—Nazim
Pasha, commander-in-chief of the
Turkish army; Isset Pasha, com-
mander of general staff of the war
office, and late commander-in-chief;
Yemen and Chadan Bey, councillors
of state, have been appointed Otto-
man plenipotentiaries for the nego-
tiation of an armistice with the Bul-
garian representatives.

The question of peace bulks large
in the foreground. The fact that the
official communications with regard
to the Bulgarian reply, issued at
both Constantinople and Sofia, make
no mention of preliminary conditions
has given rise to comment, as it was
generally expected that Bulgaria
would insist upon fixing bases before
consenting to enter upon negotia-
tions. Indeed, the belief was very
general that Bulgaria would demand
the capitulation of Adrianople and
other fortified places, and the foreign
minister recently stated to the am-
bassadors that Turkey would refuse
to entertain any such stipulation.

Apparently Bulgaria has found
good reasons for refraining from such
an attitude, especially as the enter-
ing upon pourparlers will not com-
pel the suspension of hostilities until
the armistice has been actually
signed.

New York, Nov. 21—A special cable
from Constantinople via Guizava,
Roumania says: The terms of peace
offered to Turkey by the Balkan al-
lies are:—The cession of the whole of
Turkey in Europe, as far as and in-
cluding the Chatalia line. The city of
Constantinople to remain Turkish, but
a friendly entry of a portion of the
allied armies to occupy the city until
a definite treaty has been arranged.

It is stated that the Ottoman cabi-
net favors the acceptance of all the
conditions except the cession of the
coast line of the sea of Marmora
and the Dardanelles and the entry
of the allied forces into Constanti-
nople. It asks guarantees regarding
the future of Albania. By an indirect
route a deputation of influential Al-
banians, have arrived here to urge
resistance to Serbia's claim upon Al-
bania, in which the deputation is
seeking Austrian support.

Diplomatists here are unanimous
in thinking the settlement of the fu-
ture status of Albania is the most
serious factor against European peace.

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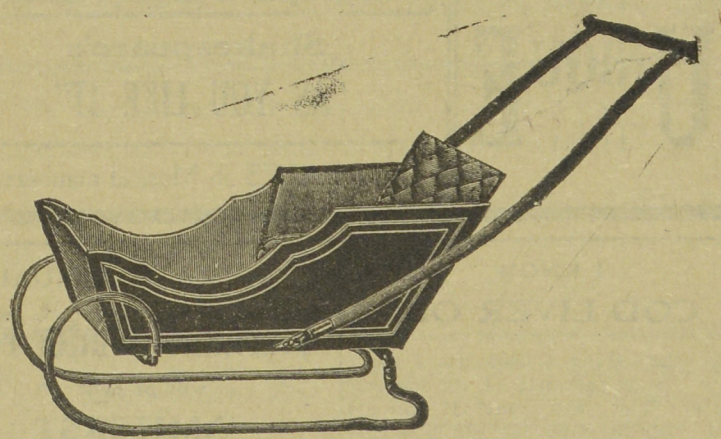
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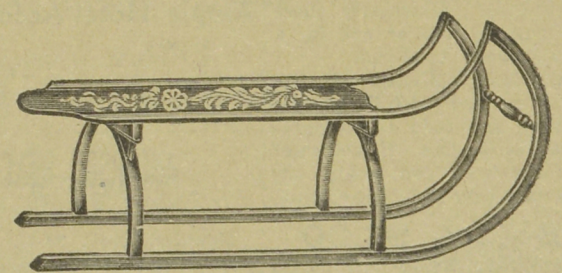
