HON. T. W. CROTHERS LIKELY TO BE SHIFTED

Ottawa, Nov. 19.—The difficulties
which the government canvassers had
with the labor vote in Hochelaga in
consequence of resentment aroused
by Hon. T. W. Crothers' attitude
towards the C.P.R. strikers and his
peremptory refusal of their applica-
tion for a Board of Conciliation and
Investigation are likely to result in
Mr. Crothers' transfer from the
labor portfolio before long.

The minister's handling of the first
real problem he has had to meet in
the administration of his department
has not been politic, and has not
commended itself to the judgment of
Premier Borden and the other min-
isters.

Mr. Crothers, it is believed, has
unnecessarily antagonized a consider-
able section of the labor vote. It is
known that he is not enamored of
the labor portfolio and would prefer
another department. Premier Bor-
den will cheerfully make the shift as
soon as arrangements can be made.

SECOND RECONSTRUCTION LATER.

But with the session now opening
it is probable that the promised re-
arrangement of portfolios will have
to be delayed until after proroga-
tion.

It can be stated, however, on good
authority that the reconstruction of
the cabinet following Mr. Monk's
retirement was but tentative and a
second "reconstruction" is in view.
With the emergency contribution
question out of the way, the premier
intends to bring Hon. F. D. Monk
back into the cabinet, as he is re-
cognized as being the only man
available who can hold the Nation-
alists for Conservative party pur-
poses.

MR. MONK FOR LABOR.

Mr. Monk is willing to come back
as minister of labor, a department in
which he has always taken special
interest and for which he is better
fitted temperamentally than for the
more onerous duties of the public
works department.

Hon. G. E. Foster is slated to be-
come the government's diplomatic
or imperial advisory representative
in London on all matters affecting
the relations between Canada and
the empire.

FURTHER PROSPECTIVE CHANGES.

Mr. Crothers will then, it is un-
derstood, become minister of trade
and commerce. Hon. Mr. Nantel,
minister of inland revenue, will be
dropped from the government at the
first convenient opportunity, and a
stronger man brought in to replace
him, probably Mr. L. T. Marchal,
who recently failed of cabinet prefer-
ment owing to the difficulty of find-
ing a safe seat for him. Mr. A. R.
Boyce, member for West Algoma, is
promised the solicitor generalship.

By this re-arrangement it is hoped
to strengthen the government's pre-
sent weakness in regard to Quebec
representation in the cabinet and to
pave the way for a rehabilitation of
Conservative fortunes in that pro-
vince with a view to the next general
election. With Mr. Monk in the labor
department, Quebec would have five
ministers with portfolio and one
minister without portfolio, Hon. Geo.
E. Foster.

BOTH PROVINCES WELL PROVID- ED FOR.

The additional portfolio would com-
pensate in a measure for the taking
away of the public works portfolio,
now held by Hon. Robert Rogers.
Ontario will still be well served with
the five portfolios of finance, railways
and canals, customs, trade and com-
merce and militia and defence, with
one minister without portfolio, Hon.
A. E. Kemp, with the solicitor gen-
eralship, and with Hon. George E.
Foster still in the government as
minister of imperial and foreign
affairs.

DISTRIBUTION OF SEED GRAIN AND POTATOES

By instructions of the Hon. Min-
ister of Agriculture a distribution of
superior sorts of grain and potatoes
will be made during the coming win-
ter and spring to Canadian farmers.
The samples for general distribution
will consist of spring wheat (5 lbs.),
white oats (4 lbs.) barley (5 lbs.),
and field peas (5 lbs.) These will
be sent out from Ottawa. A distri-
bution of potatoes (in 3 lb. samples)
will be carried on from several of
the experimental farms, the Central
Farm at Ottawa supplying only the
provinces of Ontario and Quebec. All
samples will be sent free, by mail.

Applicants must give particulars
in regard to the soil on their farms,
and some account of their experience
with such kinds of grain (or po-
tatoes) as they have grown, so
that a promising sort for their con-
ditions may be selected.

Each application must be separate
and must be signed by the applicant.
Only one sample of grain and one of
potatoes can be sent to each farm.
Applications on any kind of printed
form cannot be accepted. If two
or more samples are asked for in the
same letter only one will be sent.

As the supply of seed is limited,
farmers are advised to apply early;
but the applications will not neces-
sarily be filled in the exact order in
which they are received. Preference
will always be given to the most
thoughtful and explicit requests. Ap-
plications received after the end of
January will probably be too late.

All applications for grain (and ap-
plications from the provinces of On-
tario and Quebec for potatoes)
should be addressed to the Dominion
Cerealist, Central Experimental Farm
Ottawa. Such applications require
no postage. If otherwise addressed
delay and disappointment may oc-
cur.

Applications, for potatoes, from
farmers in any other province should
be addressed (postage prepaid) to the
Superintendent of the nearest Branch
Experimental Farm in that province.




ENGINEERS MEET AT AKRON
