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THE SUBURBAN TRAINS

Hundreds of decent Conservatives who voted to sustain the Flemming Government two years ago scarcely expected at the time that they would be humiliated by that Government. York County has been given a splendid exhibition of the work of small-bore Tory Politicians. Having acquired a full knowledge of parliamentary procedure and practice, Col. McLeod, M. P., was able to return from Ottawa and spend a week organizing a party convention for the nomination of his chief henchman, Ex-Ald. Guthrie. It appears that Col. McLeod, M. P., is not such a mighty man after all, when it comes to accomplishing something for York County. Last week he boasted with a great flourish that he had stopped the \$20,000 manager of the I. R. C. from taking off some of the suburban trains on the Marysville-Fredericton route. The cancellation order was held up for a few days but the announcement again was made that it will go into effect Sunday February 1st. This is a matter of the greatest importance to the people of Marysville as well as the merchants of Fredericton and they will expect York's member to bestir himself. Had this outrage been attempted when the present Judge Crocket was representing the County he would have undoubtedly ventilated the matter in Parliament.

Martin & Company, who represented themselves as contractors, but who were in reality Burns detectives put it over some members of the Quebec legislature in a little business transaction a few weeks ago, the details of which are now being given to the public.

The knowing ones say that it is a lucky thing for the Flemming government that Burns detectives have no connection with the American and Canadian firms who have been doing business in this province the last year or two. Possibly Premier Flemming suspected a frame-up when he stopped an official from accepting a pretent of a diamond ring a short time ago. Had the enterprising firm of Martin & Co. been on deck three years ago they undoubtedly would have secured the contract for the construction of the Southampton Railway.

The Montreal Daily Mail has kicked up quite a rampus in the Quebec Legislature by accusing one member of the lower house and two of the Legislative Council in connection with the passing of a bill incorporating the Montreal Fair Association. A Yankee concern called Martin and Co., contractors, the members of which, are members of the Burns International Detective Agency, were the promoters of the bill. Messrs. W. E. Nicholls, and B. A. McNab, president and manager of the Daily Mail appeared before the bar of the Legislature and preferred their charges. Committees from both houses are now conducting an investigation. The accused members have since resigned their seats.

The removal of the countervailing duty on flour, which the Liberals sought to bring about in parliament this week, would have meant a saving of sixty cents a barrel. There are altogether about eight thousand families in York county, which must use on an average three barrels each year. This would make a total of twenty-five thousand barrels upon which duties amounting to fourteen thousand four hundred and forty dollars would have been saved to the people in this county. A trifling matter of this kind is, of course, of no importance to Col. McLeod, M.P. He was not even in his place in parliament when the vote was taken. Had he been there he would have voted against it.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his forces in parliament lost no time in challenging a vote on the question of free wheat and wheat products. Of course the government supporters acting on behalf of the milling interests and the railways, voted the motion down. The Liberals had the satisfaction, however, of winning Mr. Billy McLean, the Tory member for South York, over to their side.

The Montreal Times scooped in \$21,000 from the Dominion government for printing and advertising last year, while The St. John Standard came in for \$16,000. The Fredericton hack organ, which prides itself on being the leading Liberal-Conservative paper in New Brunswick, was let down with only \$2,200. The returns from the provincial arena, however, will bring the hack organ up into line with The Standard.

That the Tory convention was deliberately packed to prevent Mr. C. H. Thomas from getting the nomination there is not the slightest doubt in the world. And the men who packed the convention are the very men who go about the back country districts waving the old flag and preach the gospel of equal rights to all and special privileges to none.

Our old friend Mr. A. D. Thomas will now have a chance to set York on fire by going out into the county and discussing the local government's gift of one thousand dollars to Rev. Father Cormier.

TO GET OUT THE WOMEN VOTERS

Chicago, Ill., Feb. 2.—Tomorrow will be registration day for the April election, when the women of Chicago are to have the first opportunity to exercise their new rights of franchise. The women's clubs have appointed leaders and workers for every ward and precinct and a house-to-house canvass is being conducted. The work is being conducted on an absolutely non-partisan basis.

MONTREAL FIREMEN FOUGHT THREE FIRES

Montreal, Feb. 1.—Three fires that broke out within an hour this morning kept the Montreal fire fighters on the jump a large part of the day, and did damage of about \$250,000.

The most serious was that which destroyed the premises occupied by the Merchants' Clothing Company and other firms at 36 West Notre Dame Street, in the heart of the downtown business district.

About the same time the Deaf and Dumb Institution, in the north end of the city, was in flames, and then occurred a blaze in the Canadian Pacific Atlantic line elevator on King Edward pier.

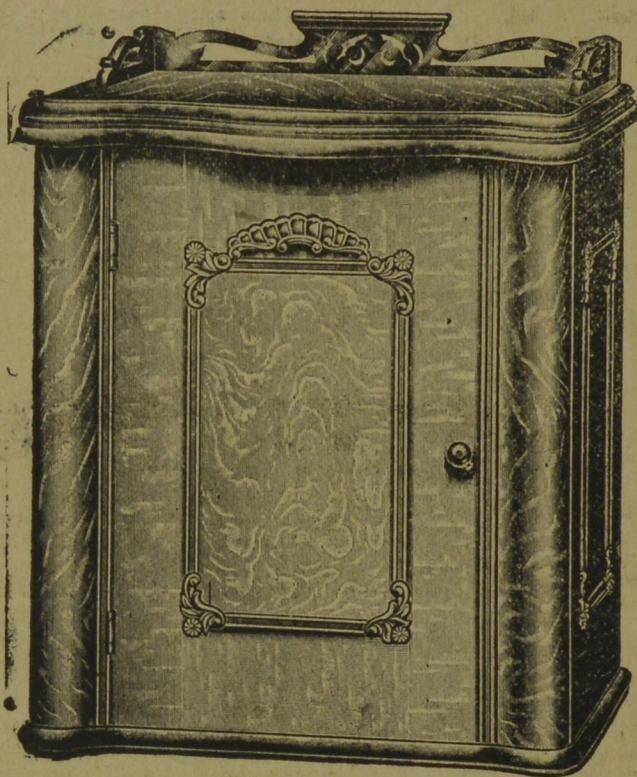

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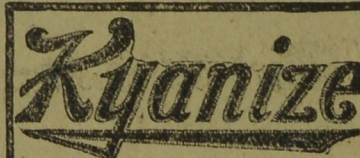

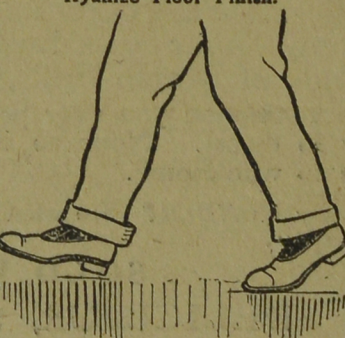
