Fredericton High Won in Interscholastic

SIX-MEN HOCKEY PROVED VERY FAST EXHIBITION

Fredericton Beat Marysville 11 to 8
Saturday Night---Mike Murphy
Hurt Before Game

Six-men hockey was given its first try-out here this season Saturday night. Fredericton came out victorious by a score of 11 to 8. The ice was in poor shape for real hockey. Fredericton had the misfortune to have one of its players badly injured before the game started. Mike Murphy was talking to the referee and Frechette shot the puck wide of the net, striking Mike under the left eye. The injury caused his retirement from the game.

Burden was to play at centre-ice, but owing to the mishap he played cover-point. Frechette and Jimmy Murphy of the winners, were the stars of the game. Hughes and Robertson of the losers, played good hockey. The teams will meet again next Thursday night in a league game.

THE GAME.

The game started off at whirlwind speed, Frechette receiving the puck on a pass from Flett and scored in twenty seconds of play. McMorris evened things up a couple of minutes later and the scoring stopped for a time. Robertson put his team in the lead after nine minutes of play on a pass from Arnold. Frechette tied the score on one of his long shots in eleven minutes of play. Titus made some great stops and it was his work that saved his team on many occasions. Fredericton again took the lead when Burden carried the puck down and passed to Coward, who scored in twelve minutes of play. Frechette was penalized for loafing and Titus again made some sensational stops. "Nat" Hovey replaced Murphy. The period ended 3 to 2 in favor of Fredericton.

SECOND PERIOD.

Frechette scored in three minutes of play after an end-to-end rush. Wade and Arnold were both put off for two minutes for slashing. Hughes scored on a long shot for the Crescents and McMorris tied the score a few minutes later. Murphy and Wade both scored for the Victorias and put the team two goals in the lead. Rutter replaced Murphy at point and Flett relieved Wade at centre. Coward carried the puck down the ice and passed to Burden, who scored in eighteen minutes of play. The period ended 7 to 4 in favor of Fredericton.

THIRD PERIOD.

Wade replaced Flett. "Tanker" Hughes made another fine shot and scored in three minutes of play. Murphy scored on a pass from Wade a minute later. Flett replaced Wade. There was considerable argument as to whether a player could be replaced in the third period but the referee, backed by the rule-book, won the decision that a player could be replaced at any time during the game. Titus fell down in his net on two occasions. In the second he was put off for two minutes. Coward scored in eight minutes on a good shot. McMorris scored for the Crescents and Murphy scored two for the Victorias. Arnold scored. Flett was put off two minutes for loafing and Frechette for the rest of the game. Robertson scored during the last minute of play. Thus the game ended 11 to 8 in favor of Fredericton.

Mooney, St. John's rover was the fastest all-round player on the ice. He scored his team's lone tally on a brilliant rush, down centre ice near the close of the game.
