JANUARY WAS
REMARKABLE FOR
COLD AND SNOW

Temperature was Lower Than Average for Forty-one Years---Snowfall Was More Than Two and a Half Feet

The weather statistics for the month of January as prepared by Dr. C. C. Jones, director of the Dominion Meteorological Station, show that during the month the temperature has been 11 degrees lower than last year and 2 degrees lower than the average temperature of the last forty-one years. There was not nearly as much rain as last year but the snow-fall was much heavier, there being an increase of several inches. The snow-fall for the month was upwards of 2½ feet. There was an increase of 15 hours of sunlight over last year and the wind mileage was decreased by 1,453 miles.

The statistics are as follows:
Average mean temperature, 10.9 degrees above.

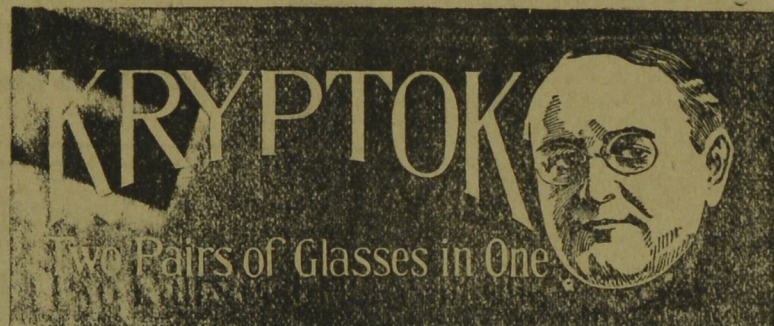
Average mean temperature last year, 21.9 degrees above.

Highest temperature, 45 degrees above.
