## OARSMEN IN NATIONAL REGATTA

Philadelphia, Pa., Aug. 7.—A myriad of racing shells, propelled by eights, fours, doubles or individual oarsmen, darted hither and thither on the broad stretches of the Schuylkill River this morning in final practice for the forty-second championship regatta of the National Association of Amateur Oarsmen. Several of the preliminary events of the program were pulled off this afternoon, but in accordance with custom all of the big races have been reserved for Saturday.

The complete program of races include a quarter-mile dash for single scullers; intermediate, association and senior single sculls; intermediate and senior double sculls; intermediate, senior and international four-oared shells; senior quadruple sculls; intermediate and senior eight-oared shells, all championship events with two added races, junior eight-oared shells and intercity octuple sculls.

The regatta has attracted many of the best scullers and crews of the United States and Canada. Among the cities represented will be Philadelphia, Boston, New York, Washington, Buffalo, Baltimore, Newark, Duluth, Cleveland, Montreal, Toronto and Winnipeg.

Philadelphia unions are preparing elaborate entertainment for the delegates to the annual convention of the American Federation of Labor to be held in that City in November.

## QUEER TASTES OF ANIMALS

## Fruit Diet to Stop Strikes

Dr. J. Oldfield, the advocate of a fruitarian diet, lecturing in London, said that labor unrest was really a dietetic trouble. "Feed men," said the doctor, "on meat diet and they develop mental as well as physical uneasiness. The solution of the whole labor trouble is a dietetic one." Dr. Oldfield's argument was that every set of animals has its diet—there are herbivores, carnivores, and so on. Every sub-class has its individual diet—for instance, acorns are poisonous to cattle, and not to pigs; and again, each species has its particular fancy in food. The human race, by all the evidence, is closely allied to the anthropoid apes, and therefore a fruit-ivorous diet is indicated for us, for the apes are fruitarians.

## Marriages of the Deaf

An examination has been made of the records of 4,500 marriages of the deaf, and it has been found that, while taking the marriages of deaf persons as a whole, nearly 9 per cent. of the offspring are deaf, and contrasted with less than one-tenth of 1 per cent. of deaf children as a result of the marriages of normal persons; a very favorable result is obtained if it be found that the deaf parents had no trace of previous deafness in their families. Marriages of deaf persons without deaf relatives is no more likely to result in deaf children than any marriage in the community at large, while marriages of hearing persons who have deaf relatives is just as likely to result in deaf children as the marriage of the deaf.

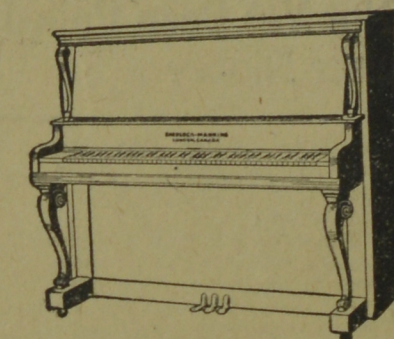

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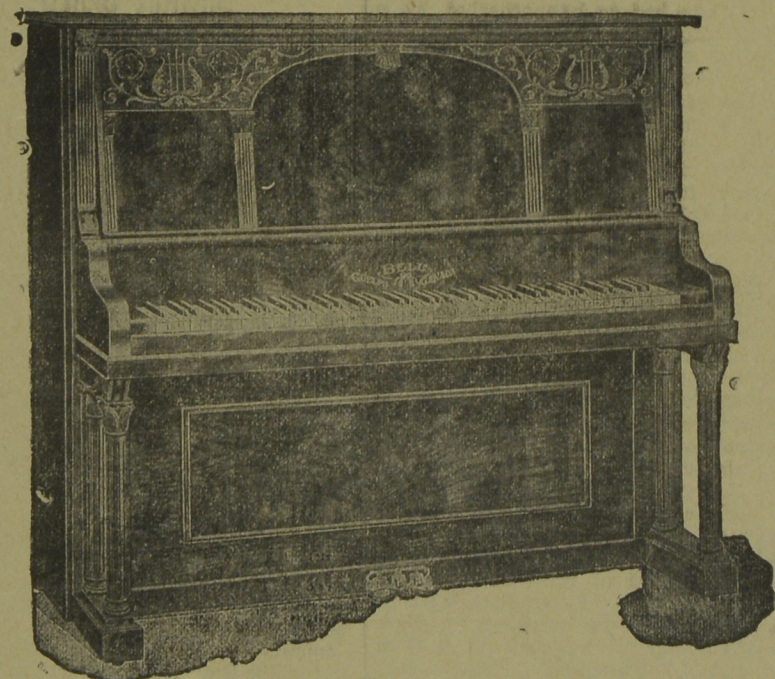
