EXAMINATION OF
VOLUNTEERS FOR ACTIVE
SERVICE BEGINS

Twenty Passed Medical Officer This Morning--Will Continue Sunday--
Course for Cadet-Instructors Comes to Abrupt Stop

Medical examination of volunteers for active service in the force of 25,000 troops being raised by Canada for foreign service in the present war, began this morning. Major S. F. A. Wainwright, senior medical officer of the 71st York Regt., conducted the examination with the assistance of the detachment of Permanent Army Medical Corps at No. 3 Infantry Station. The volunteers were examined in one of the rooms of the hospital at the military station and after being passed were sworn in by various company officers of the 71st Regt. More men presented themselves for examination this morning than could be examined by Major Wainwright. The examination is being continued this afternoon, however, and will also go on this evening and Sunday. There were few rejections this morning.

HEAVY RECEIPTS
FROM TIMBER LICENSE
RENEWALS AND BONUS

Upwards of \$300,000 Estimated to Have Been Received at Crown Land Office--\$80,000 From One Company

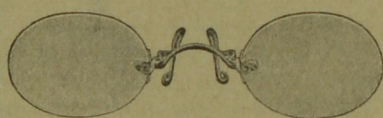
Money has been pouring into the Crown Land Office since August first in large amounts, the annual revenue of timber licenses and payment on bonuses being made. The total amount received is expected to be in excess of \$300,000 but the department is not yet in a position to state what the amount will be.

Lt.-Col. T. G. Loggie, deputy minister of mines and lands, stated this morning that the way in which payments have been made would indicate that the lumber business was in a flourishing condition in New Brunswick. Money has never come into the Crown Land Department more readily than this year. The Bathurst Lumber Company, with a payment of upwards of \$80,000, was the heaviest individual lessee. The Richards Lumber Company's payment totals upwards of \$50,000.

Accountant McLeod began making up the total receipts yesterday, not having an opportunity before on account of the rush of lessees to pay. It is expected that an announcement of receipts will be made next week.

PREMIER FLEMMING HERE.

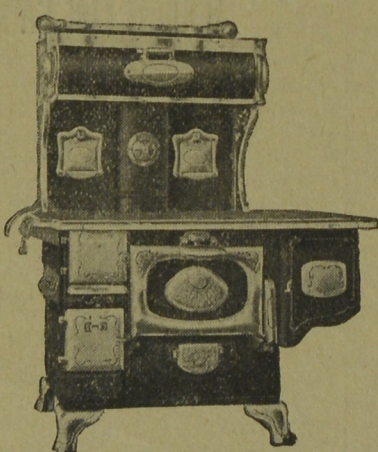
