The session of the Legislature which was brought to a close on Saturday afternoon has been one of the longest and in some respects one of the most important since confederation. The usual number of bills were passed but with the exception of the Valley Rail way bill, which adds the sum of two million dollars to the liabilities of reaching in importance. With a donothing government in control of affairs, it is perhaps, too much to expect it to enact any great amount of legislation likely to improve the conditions of life in this province. Legislation of this kind calls for the exercise of the qualities of statesmanship and these qualities are of course, sadly lacking in the members of the present administration. They seem to labor under the belief that they have been placed in office to spend money and increase the public debt and add to the taxation of the people that the Flemming government has been more successful than its predebe, his political career is at an end.




