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## HOME RULE FOR IRELAND

Last week His Majesty King George V gave his assent to the bill granting home rule to Ireland, but it will not go into effect for a year or at least until the close of the European war. In the meantime an amending bill will be put through the imperial parliament and the house of lords. The enactment of this long delayed measure of reform was greeted with the greatest enthusiasm by the Liberal and Nationalist members of the house of commons. Mr. John E. Redmond the leader of the Irish parliamentary party, is being overwhelmed with congratulations from his fellow-countrymen in all parts of the world. The enactment of the bill was followed by the singing of the national anthem led by Mr. William Crooks, a Labor leader. It brings to an end the century-old feud between England and Ireland, and the friends of liberty and democracy everywhere must be glad that the struggle is over. The strong sympathy of Irishmen in Canada and the United States undoubtedly turned the scale in Ireland's favor. Now that the bill has passed, the hearty co-operation of Irishmen with Englishmen in carrying the present war to a successful issue may be expected. Mr. Redmond and Mr. Dillon are to address a meeting in Dublin along with Premier Asquith in favor of recruiting and they will speak later on at Liverpool with Hon. Winston Churchill and Mr. F. E. Smith, M.P. It is impossible at this stage to say what developments may come from the extraordinary unity of all countries and creeds, and it is not improbable that the demand for the exclusion of Ulster from the operations of the bill may disappear. The passage of the bill is a signal triumph for Premier Asquith and his government, and would not have been possible but for the enactment of the parliament bill three years ago. Mr. Asquith on that occasion secured the consent of the King to create sufficient new peers to ensure a majority of the house of lords in favor of the home rule bill and other measures on the Liberal program. This had the desired effect and the bill was adopted by the lords. It provided that any act passed three times by the house of commons would automatically become law, regardless of what action the upper house might take. It was under the provisions of this act that the home rule bill was placed on the statute book.

The chronology of the movement for self government in Ireland extends over a period of one hundred years, and is as follows:

- 1801—Act of Union by which Ireland became part of United Kingdom passed.
- 1802—Robert Emmet led first open rebellion.
- 1829—Daniel O'Connell's agitation for repeal of Act of Union unsuccessful, but led to passing of the Catholic Emancipation Act.
- 1848—Rebellion.
- 1869—Irish Protestant Church disestablished.
- 1874—First Irish Home Rule party established under the leadership of Isaac Butt.
- 1879—Land League founded by Michael Davitt.
- 1880—Charles Stewart Parnell became leader of the Irish party.
- 1880-5—Premier William E. Gladstone passed Land Act and Coercion Act and immediately imprisoned the Irish members.
- 1885—Gladstone converted to home rule.
- 1886—First Home Rule Bill introduced in British parliament; rejected by House of Commons on second reading by majority of thirty.
- 1893—Second Home Rule Bill introduced; passed by Commons, but rejected by Lords, 419 to 41.
- 1903—Wyndham's (Conservative), Land Purchase Act passed.
- 1907—Irish Secretary Augustine Birrell's Irish Councils Bill, a sort of local government, rejected by the Irish Nationalist convention and dropped by the Liberal government.
- 1912—April 23—Third Home Rule

Bill introduced by Premier Asquith. 1913—Jan. 16—Commons passes third Home Rule Bill by 110 majority. 1914—Bill signed by King George.

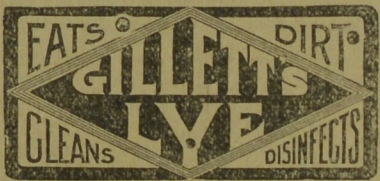

## THE COLLECTOR'S REPORT.

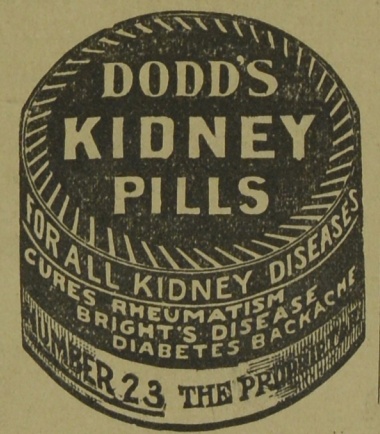

### CHANGE OF TIME ON INTERNATIONAL RAILWAY.
