71ST REGT. BAND FOR VALCARTIER TOMORROW EVENING

A Telegram From Col. Sam Hughes Asks That Matters be Expediated
---Band is up to Full Strength

Present indications point to the 71st Regimental Band leaving for Valcartier on the 6.30 I.C.R. express tomorrow evening, a telegram having been received from Col. Sam Hughes, minister of militia, this morning, requesting Bandmaster James White to expediate matters and proceed to Valcartier at the earliest possible moment. Twenty members of the band have already volunteered for active service and together with Mr. Frank Burns of Sackville, Mr. C. S. Eldson of Dorchester, and three former members of the organization, Ptes. Ernest Beatty, Roy Horncastle and McLaughlin, who are now at Valcartier with the first Canadian contingent, will bring the band up to the required strength. Bandmaster White is busy today making preparations for the band's departure and a meeting will be held tonight in the band-room at the Armory to issue the clothing and other equipment to the volunteers.

This afternoon Bandmaster White received a telegram from Capt. P. A. Guthrie asking the band to leave for Valcartier tonight but this would be impossible owing to the fact that the official orders from Col. Hughes, stating that the band was required for foreign service, only reached here yesterday. Capt. Guthrie also states in the telegram that the same arrangements will be made for mothers as for the wives of the volunteers going to the front.

According to orders the members of the band will not be required to pass a medical examination until they arrive at Valcartier camp.

DISCRIMINATION IN PASSENGER RATES CONTINUES

Over Two Months Now Since Railway Commission Handed Down Its Decision, But no Action Taken By the C. P. R.

The Board of Trade executive met last evening to consider what action should be taken in reference to the C.P.R.'s disregard to the finding of the Railway Commission in the matter of discrimination between St. John and Fredericton, on passenger rates to points west.

It is more than two months since the Railway Commission handed down its judgment in the matter and gave Fredericton the favor of rates not greater than those of St. John, but up to date no change has been made by the C.P.R.

It was decided to notify Mr. H. L. Drayton of this fact and make a further effort to get the new rates adjusted.

The matter of a program for the October meeting of the board was discussed and the subject agreed upon was "Events Leading up to the Present War." Two speakers will deal with this interesting subject at the next meeting.

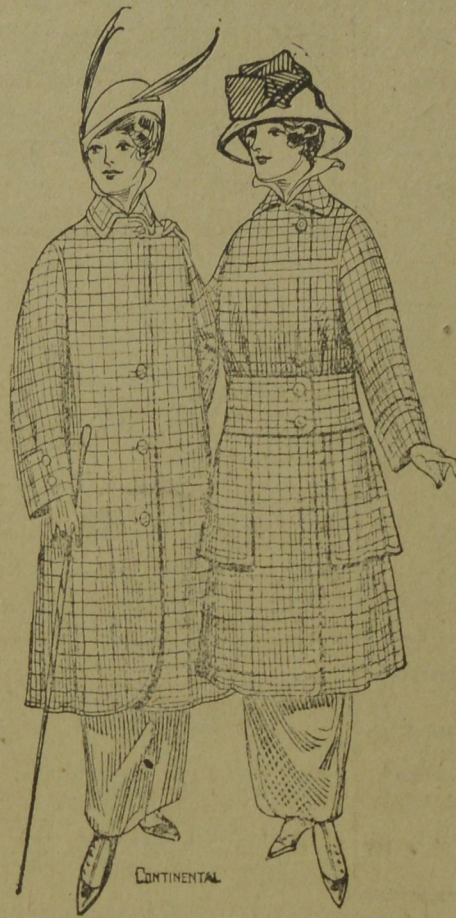

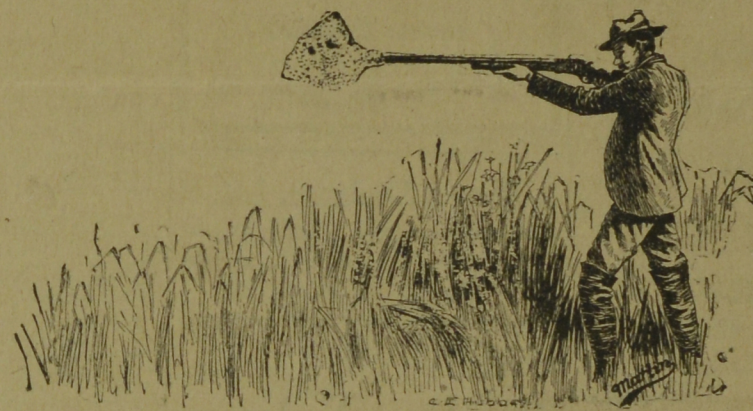
