(St. John Times.)

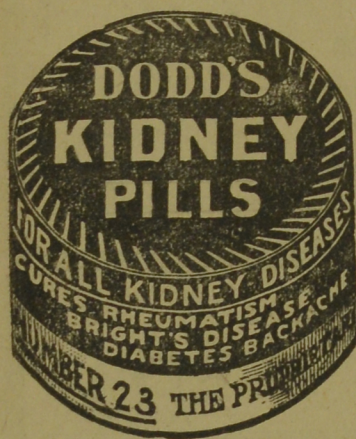
His Honor William Wilberforce Wells is the third member of the Royal Commission to investigate the Dugal charges.

His appointment was announced today by His Honor Lieut. Governor Wood. Former Judge Wells has signified his acceptance and will return from Ottawa, where he now is, in a few days to act on the commission. His Honor also announced that Mr. Justice McKeown would be chairman. Judge Wells bears an honorable and distinguished record amongst the prominent members of the bar and bench in the province. He was appointed county court judge for Kent and Westmorland counties on October 21, 1893, and successfully fulfilled the duties of the office until his retirement about two or three years ago. He was crown prosecutor for Westmorland, 1879, and later clerk of the circuit and county courts. He successfully practised his profession as barrister in Dorchester and Moncton.

Judge Wells is a native of Bayfield, N.B., where he was born on June 10, 1855. His appointment, with the selection of Judge McKeown as chairman, and the choice of W. S. Fisher as the other member should be most satisfactory to all interested and ensure a just and impartial hearing.

## HACK ORGAN HAS FORFEITED ALL CLAIMS ON DECENT MEN

"Citizen" Resents It's Campaign of Slander Against Mayor Mitchell--Has Split the Conservative Party of York County in Twain--Does Premier Flemming, Who Addresses Religious Gatherings on the Formation of Character, Stand for This Sort of Thing?

To the Editor of The Mail:

Dear Sir:—In The Gleaner's attack upon Mayor Mitchell it has demonstrated to the satisfaction of the intelligent reading public that its first moral (that is immoral) law is, Thou shalt slander every man who does not uphold The Gleaner in its campaign against decent citizenship. In its editorial of Friday it made fairly good headway in unfolding its second moral law, namely, When any man charged by The Gleaner with any offence is proven innocent then continue to slander him. Among gentlemen, when innocence is vindicated, there is always an apology. Among barbarians, there is rage and revenge. Many people were asking after the recount, What will The Gleaner say now? One old fellow remarked, Wait and see. The Gleaner will only try to blacken the mayor the more. This proved correct. At first, the mayor was indecent and knew he was not legally elected. After the recount, he is a fool. Such is The Gleaner's immoral code.

But this leads to a big issue. The Gleaner receives thousands of dollars of public money every year from the GRAND OLD CONSERVATIVE PARTY (which H. F. McLeod recently said had been transformed into Macleodites) and its settled policy is to blacken the reputation of Fredericton's chief magistrate. The Gleaner knows it has no decent reason for its torrent of slander. If it had it would trot it out. It knows it slandered the mayor. And now when he is vindicated there is not only no apology, but abuse multiplied by pure gall. DOES THE CONSERVATIVE PARTY STAND FOR THIS SORT OF FEELING? DOES PREMIER FLEMMING, WHO GIVES ADDRESSES TO RELIGIOUS GATHERINGS UPON THE FORMATION OF CHARACTER, STAND FOR IT? DOES THE ATTORNEY GENERAL? Will the hundreds of decent Conservatives who supported the mayor stand for it? Just as soon as the general public see the real issue there will be a day of reckoning and when that day comes The Gleaner is doomed. It is a matter of common knowledge that already a large section of the party see clearly that The Gleaner is dragging the party to ruin. AS THE ORGAN OF THE GRAFTERS IT DID NOBLE SERVICE LAST WINTER IN SPLITTING THE PARTY IN YORK COUNTY. IT HAS FORFEITED ALL CLAIM ON DECENT MEN AND MEN WHO STAND FOR DECENT PUBLIC LIFE. The next generation will read the files and wonder whether the editorial staff belonged morally to the blackhand society, the penitentiary or the infants' home. To place the platform of the party in one column and The Gleaner in another would cause even the father of lies to take a back seat.

The mayor's statement concerning temperance was correct. Mayor Mitchell represents the movement for decent government. The Gleaner says the temperance people are to be pitied. Are they to be pitied as much now as if The Gleaner's pet had been elected? Everyone knows that the grafters did their level best to elect W. E. Farrell. The shrieking of the Gleaner is the howling of the grafters who have nothing to show for the thousands they put into the campaign to defeat Mayor Mitchell. 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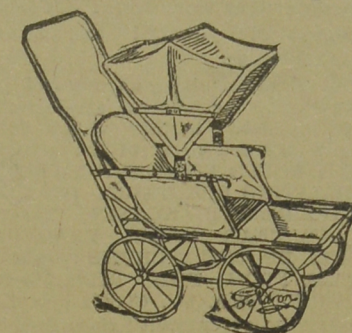
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DO YOU KNOW?
