REVIVALIST OF NEW ORDER TO BE HERE NEXT WEEK

Important Events in the World's History Revealed by Motion Pictures---The Photo Drama of Creation to be Shown Free of Charge.

There is a species of revival new under the sun—one which astounds the worthy old divines who, with pounding of pulpit and roaring portractions of wrath to come, once dragged sinners to the "mourner's bench." The Photo-Drama of Creation eloquently portrays the Creator's tender designs for His creatures and shows the progressive steps in the divine order of creation to its completion.

STORY OF VAST SCOPE.

The originators of "Creation" have enlarged that stupendous work by assuming that the creative work did not end with the activities recorded in Genesis, but is in process today and everlastingly. The endless story begins with the cosmic nebulae of pre-solar eras and dwells upon the salient events of Biblical history from the Garden of Eden to Paradise restored. The progress of ancient and modern civilization down to this year of grace A.D., 1914, is traced and by the light of prophecy the glories of the future are pictured.

To delineate this enormous subject two miles of films are used and these with pictures and panoramas, require eight hours to present upon the canvas. Because of its length the production is divided into sections, and these are shown in rotation, so that to witness the whole one must attend four performances. A lecture is given with each exhibition by a wonderful talking machine accurately geared to accompany the progress of the story on the screen. The apparatus sings and talks with such aptness to the varying scenes and figures that one might fancy it a human lecturer of unusual vocal gifts.

The teaching which the photo-drama is designed to disseminate is that the Bible account of creation as well as its other records are not contradicted by modern science, but that in fact, science proves the truth of The Book. For instance: the raining of fire and brimstone upon Sodom and Gomorrah is said to be paralleled in the destruction of Pompeii and Martinière. Lot's wife, loath to leave her home and friends lagged behind her husband and daughters, and was overcome by the deadly fumes, the effect being to transform her into a pillar of salt. Modern chemistry readily verifies this peculiar case by indicating the chemical action these gases would have under similar circumstances.

Several reels of film, telling most impressive and inspiring narratives, culled from both Old and New Testaments, are said to have been actually secured in the Old World, where the historical events took place; incidents of Israelitish bondage, the exodus from Egypt, etc. The touching scenes which impress the poignant features of our Lord's agonized prayer in Gethsemane are claimed to have been photographed by moving picture experts at the very spot where Jesus is believed to have knelt in prayer just prior to the Iscariot's betrayal of him with a kiss.

APPEALS TO ALL CLASSES.

Such a subject as "Creation" treated in such a way could not fail in its appeal to every class of people in a community, and it is not surprising that people are attracted who would never be seen inside a church. Not that the film is intended for this class only; the I.H.S.A. heartily welcomes members of all denominations, and through the phonograph they are told and on the screen they see things they never heard mentioned in a pulpit.

It was their recognition of the grip which moving pictures have secured upon the public imagination and their appreciation of their power to transform cold print into palpitating, living things, that led the association to make them a principal instrument of their work.

In the past ministers have concentrated their attack almost exclusively upon the "ear-gate" as John Bunyan called it. But a simultaneous assault upon two separate points in the same defense has a far greater chance of success than an isolated onslaught. When instructors in general awake to the fact that there is an "eye-gate" as well as an "eye-gate" they will adopt the moving picture armory of the International Bible Students' Association.

These great pictures will be shown free of charge in the City Opera House during the week beginning Monday, November 2nd. There will be a change of program nightly.

WOULD WELCOME THE CANADIANS

London, Oct. 27.—That London should be permitted to welcome the Canadian troops before they leave for the front is the plea made today in the leading article of the London Daily Mail. While recognizing that the present crisis is too serious a business for flag-waving the Mail thinks that popular sentiment should be catered to when it can be done without sacrifice of military efficiency. "The whole nation," adds the Mail, "would like the Canadian troops to know how deeply it values the high spirit of loyalty and self-sacrifice to which their presence, their quality and admirable equipment emphatically testify. If the Canadian forces could be marched through London on their way to the battlefields, in France the welcome they would receive would be such as would send a thrill to the farthest ends of the British dominions."

Food For a Life Time

An English scientist with a passion for statistics computed the amount of food that the average man eats in a lifetime. He asserts that in the process of attaining his three score years and ten he eats about fifty-four tons of solid food and fifty-three tons of liquid. He will have eaten 12,000 eggs, 400 pounds of cheese, about four tons of fish, and, could it have been all baked at once, a loaf of bread equal in size to an ordinary family hotel. But think of the vegetables devoured! The scientist says a train three miles long would be required to bring a life's supply to the average man.

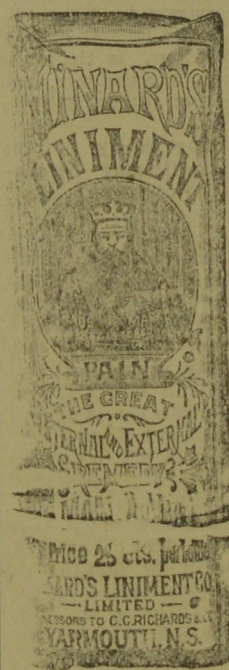

RIVERS-BUCKELEY

KILLED IN BATTLE

Ottawa, Oct. 26.—The death of Major Rivers-Buckleley in action at the front is announced in a cable received on Sunday at Government House, where he was formerly Comptroller of the Household. He left to join his regiment shortly after the outbreak of the war. Upwards of a year ago he was married to Miss Pelly, lady-in-waiting to the Duchess of Connaught.

Born in 1876, Major Thomas Henry Rivers-Buckleley began his military career in 1894 when he joined the Oxford Militia; in 1897 he was appointed captain. He took a commission in the Scots Guards in 1899 and became captain in 1904. From 1899 to 1902 he served in South Africa with distinction having been wounded at Belmont, and was mentioned in despatches for heroic conduct. For these he received the Queen's medal with six clasps, and the King's medal with two.

Major Rivers-Buckleley was aide-de-camp to Lord Curzon, Viceroy of India in 1904 and 1905, and Comptroller of the Household. When Lord Minto was Viceroy he served in a similar capacity from 1905 to 1907. In the latter year he became aide-de-camp to His Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught, then Inspector of the Forces, and continued to serve as such when the Duke was Commander-in-Chief and High Commissioner in the Mediterranean from 1907 to 1909. In 1911 he came to Canada as equerry and Comptroller of the Household to the Duke.

After a subsequent sojourn in England, when his marriage took place, early last year, Major Rivers-Buckleley returned to Ottawa, and was here

LET CONTRACTS

FOR EQUIPMENT

Ottawa, Oct. 27.—Most of the contracts for the equipment of the second Canadian contingent have now been let and long before the force is ready to leave for England the men will be fully equipped. The uniforms and equipment will be distributed amongst the local divisional centres as fast as they are ready.

The sub-committees of the cabinet which is engaged in allotting the contracts for military supplies has been meeting daily and held a long conference this morning and again tonight when further heavy contracts for clothing and equipment were let. The contracts are being distributed as widely and impartially as possible, with a view to keeping Canadian working-men employed.

The members of the sub-committees are Sir George Foster, Hon. J. D. Reid, Hon. C. J. Doherty, Hon. Louis Coderre and Hon. J. D. Hazen.
