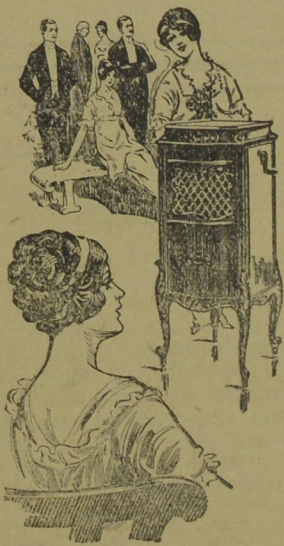

## QUICK VERDICT IN CASE OF COTE BOYS

Houlton, Dec. 4.—After an absence of seven minutes in the supreme court Wednesday morning, the jury in the case of Louis and Bert Cote, aged respectively eight and thirteen, who had been tried on Tuesday for the killing of eleven-year-old Hartley Webb, returned a verdict of guilty of manslaughter. The original charge was murder, but late on Tuesday afternoon, at the close of the testimony, the state had not pressed that part of the indictment alleging malice aforethought.

Each of the young respondents was then sentenced to a reform school for the remainder of his minority, with the alternative of a jail sentence if he didn't behave there; and thus ended the legal aftermath of a peculiarly fantastic crime—one unique in the criminal history of Aroostook county. At the opening of the court Justice Haley charged the jury, speaking very slowly and reading parts of his charge from manuscript. He called attention to the fact that the state had not pressed that part of the in-

works received a \$2,000 note from one Gershon Maves, a contractor under the government. Every Conservative newspaper in Canada had the story wired to it. For the moment I received universal condemnation. Had the story been true my leader would not have permitted me to remain in his cabinet for a single day. But I was able to show that the affidavit was the result of a conspiracy to destroy me politically—that a false date was given in the affidavit, and that the note in question was made before I became minister or a member of parliament, and was made for professional services of an important character which I had rendered to the maker of the note. But applying to Mr. Flemming the same rule which would have been properly applied to me, if I had been proved guilty of the charge made in the affidavit referred to, what answer can be made to this part of the findings of the commissioners? But Mr. Chairman, I am not today on trial, and in my long professional experience I failed to find that when one man was charged with an offense, it was any defence or excuse to plead that some one else had been guilty of an equal or similar offence. All that I need say is that if my political conduct has been even half as bad as Mr. Flemming's conduct as disclosed by then there are certainly at least two of the report of these commissioners, political moral cripples who ought to be relegated to the political bone pile at the earliest possible date.

Let me, Mr. Chairman and friends, in conclusion, express to you again the greatest pleasure which it gives me to be present tonight. Mr. Carvell and Mr. Dugal deserve the best that we or the people of this province can do for them.

### MR. DUGAL'S SPEECH.

Addressing the gathering in French, Mr. Dugal referred to the honor conferred on him by the friends who organized this magnificent banquet. He said:

"I have not been in the habit of speaking ill of anyone, but having placed before me what I consider sufficient evidence to warrant me in making the charges of misconduct and corruption, I felt that a sense of duty compelled me to speak out boldly and fearlessly from my seat in the legislature. I simply followed the dictates of my conscience.

"The accomplishment of one's duty either in public or private life, should be actuated by justice, sincerity, devotion and the determination warranted by the circumstances. The pages of history, which are now being written in this province, will tell to future generations how those placed in the high and honorable positions accomplished their duty. All glory to those who have honestly done their duty, and those who have failed in doing so will, I hope, receive their just reward at the hands of those to whom they must sooner or later render an account."

He referred to the late elections in which he had asked to be elected for the purpose of establishing an honest administration of affairs, and he hoped that the work he had been called to do would some day bear fruit. He had hoped that the foundations of honest government would have been laid before tonight. He also expressed the hope that every one present would do their utmost to bring about a reform that would surely safeguard the interests and the honor of our province.

### SCORED MUD SLINGERS.

He referred to the canvass used by some that all politicians were more or less given to a desire of accumulating riches at the public expense. He made a protest against such flippant assertions, adding that such attempts made to besmirch the character of many great men who had adorned our legislative halls could not and should not be tolerated. He instanced the congratulations showered on Sir Wilfrid Laurier in his seventy-third birthday to show how easy it was for public men to be up-right and receive therefore the plaudits of their fellow citizens, and referred to the presence of Senator Costigan, whose long political career

dictament alleging murder, so that a verdict of manslaughter was the highest degree of homicide that could be returned. Murder, he continued, means crime committed with malice aforethought and malice aforethought is the action of a mind capable of forming a desire. A person guilty of murder, therefore, must have held an intent formed with a knowledge of the consequences. In children of less than seven, no presumption of intent exists; their minds are too immature. And children between the ages of seven and fourteen are not presumed to intend the consequences of their criminal acts, as are adults, although the state may prove the intent, if it can. In the present case, it had seemed to the state officials, and to the court that the evidence had not proved the intent, and so the charge of the supreme degree of homicide—the murder charge—had been not-pressed. In other words, the Cote boys acted with out malice.

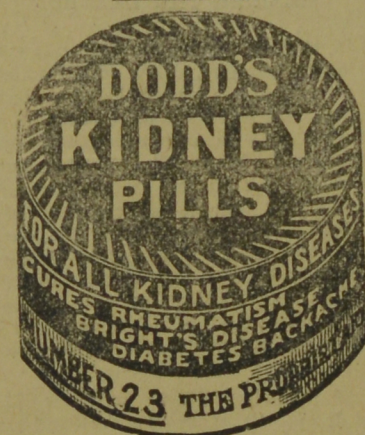
Canaries delight in eating lettuce, which is well known for its narcotic properties, and they will eat it to such an extent as to leave themselves stupefied for a long time afterwards.

In conclusion, he expressed the hope that New Brunswick would always in the future have at its legislative men who would so administer its affairs as to be able to leave the fair name of our province unsullied and respected by all.

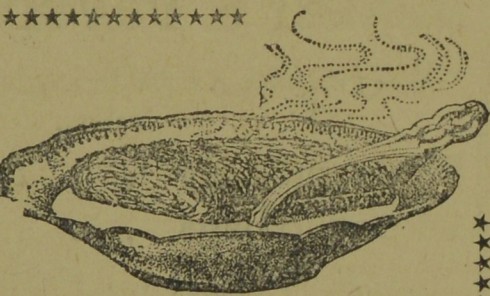
