"We are out for a record, but Jim and I have a way of doing things fast," said pretty little Mrs. Hartley last night. "I met him one Thursday and the next Thursday we were married. I guess this walking trip we are taking couldn't be done by people who like to do things faster than we do."

LITTLE WOMAN IS NOT AFRAID.

Filled with the joy of living, they dislike being cramped up in a city "flat" and think that if they could only get into the open where there is fresh air plenty and maybe a spice of adventure their lot would be more to their liking. "Then I shall really know what it is to live," said little Mrs. Hartley yesterday afternoon, looking up with her dark eyes beaming.

"Nervous about going? Not a bit. I wish tomorrow were here. 'Laddie' is coming with us," she said pointing to a little brown coolie which lay twinkling at the stove. "Afraid? No. Who would touch me with this revol-

ver. I have had it ever since I married Jim and wouldn't mind meeting Bourret, Beauchamp or anyone else while I have it. And besides, I won't be alone at all. We shall always be together."

Mrs. Hartley declares she is feeling fine and fit and asserts that she is a born walker. She was born in Birmingham twenty-three years ago. Mr. Hartley is three years older and was born on the border of Wales and England. Before coming to Canada, he caravanned all over England and also saw life in South Africa while he was serving with the 6th Kings Royal Rifles. He was gymnastic instructor in the army and is an athletic looking fellow. Since coming to Montreal he has been a plasterer and was a member of local 33 of the plasterers' union. The life wasn't attractive however and for some weeks he has been idle from choice.

THE PROGRAMME.

Both declare they will never give in until they have completed the circle and arrive back at Montreal. WIDOW OF VICTIM PROFITS BY FRATERNAL LOVE

New York, March 30—A solemn vow made by one brother to another just before the Titanic sailed on her ill-fated voyage has just resulted in the tripling of the estate left by one of the disaster's victims to his widow.

When the appraisal of the estate of Edgar Meyer under the inheritance tax law was transmitted to the transfer tax office in the Surrogate's Court of Deputy State comptroller, Edward W. Buckley, it was found that the original estate of \$185,063 had been swelled suddenly to \$518,063.

Then it was learned that Eugene Meyer, Jr., a brother of Edgar had added to \$335,000 to the estate.

Eugene who is head of a banking and brokerage firm, in adding this large sum to his brother's estate expressed his deep love for Edgar, who died when the Titanic sank. He explained that he added this sum to his brother's estate so that the widow Mrs. Lelia Meyer, and her small daughter, Jane should reap the benefit.

Apart from personal affection Eugene said that Edgar was of incalculable assistance to the banking and brokerage firm, and that he Eugene, had promised Edgar to remember him in his will.

The ultimate death in no way relieved him of the promise, Eugene felt and he decided to avert any possible financial inconvenience that might come to his sister-in-law and little niece.

By the will of Edgar Meyer his widow is to receive one-third of the estate and their daughter the residue.

In a detailed statement accompanying his contribution, Eugene tells how Edgar and he had a long talk shortly before Edgar sailed for Europe and how he then made a solemn promise that Edgar should be remembered in his will. Eugene went further and assured Edgar that as a provision against age, a substantial amount would be set aside for him, so that he never need fear being in want.

WERE PARTED IN DEATH.

When the Titanic struck an iceberg and women passengers were being put in small boats, Mrs. Meyer stayed behind for a time refusing to leave her husband. He, like Col. John Jacob Astor Capt. Archie Butt, Isidore Strauss and others had refused to leave the ship while a woman or child was aboard.

Mrs. Meyer urged her husband to accompany her into a lifeboat, reminding him that it was his duty to regard to her safety as well as the fu-

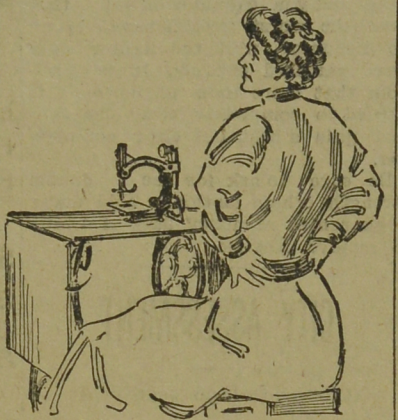
HAVE SMALL CAPITAL

HON. MR. TWEEDIE MAY RE-ENTER POLITICS

Montreal, March 31—It is more than probable that Hon. L. J. Tweedie, former prime minister of New Brunswick and late lieutenant governor of that province, will re-enter public life and lead the Liberal opposition forces at the coming provincial elections in that province. Hon. Mr. Tweedie, who was in Montreal today on his way home from Hamilton, accompanied by Mrs. Tweedie, was asked if he did not intend to re-enter public life. He replied that the party wanted him to do so, but that the way things were going in New Brunswick, it might be hard for a man to take charge of affairs and conduct them on economical and conservative lines, as he would constantly be confronted with the cry, "look what the other fellows have done."

"But being in opposition, your responsibility will be lessened," said the interviewer.

"I will not be in opposition, as we would win," said Mr. Tweedie. "There would be no manner of doubt on that score."

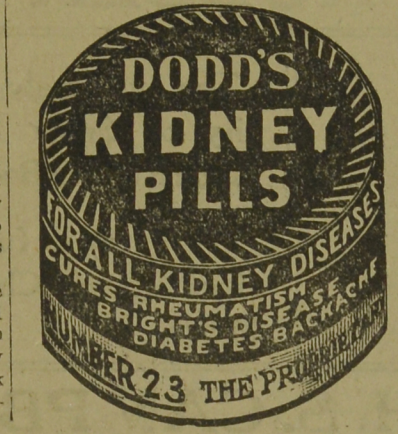
Further than this Mr. Tweedie would say nothing but the indications are that he will again become a leading factor in the public life of New Brunswick.
