DOW WING WILL BE USED TO TREAT SCARLET FEVER

Increase in Number of Patients Compelled Trustees of Victoria Public Hospital to Take That Action

A special meeting of the trustees of Victoria Public Hospital was held on Monday, chiefly for the purpose of endeavoring to provide additional accommodation for fever patients. What is known as the Dow Wing is used exclusively for contagious diseases and it seems that the wards and private rooms on the lower floor are all occupied with fever patients and recent applications have necessarily been refused admission. The upper portion of the same building has been reserved for diphtheria patients and the trustees hesitated some time before deciding to appropriate that section of the building for scarlet fever patients. The matron was immediately communicated with and in an hour the premises had been made ready for work. Of course should an outbreak of diphtheria occur just now, that disease would have to be treated outside.

Other matters were discussed at the meeting and it was decided to seek a conference with the members of the medical staff at an early day upon matters of public interest and also to solicit the views of the staff respecting the plans for the enlargement of the hospital.

As the meeting was an emergency one, it was not found convenient to secure the attendance of Coun. Pickard of Marysville. His Worship Mayor Mitchell took his seat at the board for the first time. Mr. J. F. McMurray, the president, occupied the chair and among the other members in attendance were Vice-President Clark, Mr. VanDine, Mr. Farrell, Mr. Slipp, Mr. Gregory and the secretary-treasurer.

Miss Jewel Johnston has been called to this place again to care for her aunt, Mrs. J. Maloney who had an attack of heart trouble but is slowly improving.


We are very glad to hear that Miss Annie Crowley who is ill in Victoria Hospital at Fredericton is somewhat improved.
