TO INCREASE BRITAIN'S ARMY

(Continued from Page One.)

"In Eastern Prussia small skirmishes continue."

WILL KEEP ON STRIKING

London, Sept. 9.—The allied armies continue to have the advantage, according to French official reports, in what can only be the preliminary of a great battle extending from Meaux, northeast of Paris to the fortress of Verdun, about two hundred miles further east.

The Germans, who have brought up the reinforcements, are striking at the Allies' left and centre, between Montmirail and Vitry-Le-Francois, a front of from fifty to sixty miles, but each time they have been driven back.

This is not surprising to military men, as the Germans have been compelled to advance through the swamps of the Petit Morin, and then over bare uplands to the extremely strong French position on the right. It is their only chance, however, and it is expected that they will strike and strike again. They are bringing their reinforcements down from Chalons, on the roads leading to Fere Champenoise, Sommesous, and Sompuis, in the face of the French artillery posted on the heights, which give it a great advantage.

KAISER MADE MISTAKE

London, Sept. 9.—The London Times' military correspondent, discussing the situation of the German forces, says:

"We shall raise one million men the first year, two million men the second year, and three million men the third year. We shall have a very respectable army five years hence, and it is really most tactless of the Germans to talk of peace when it will take us such a long time to get into our stride."

"Poor old Paul Kruger made just the same mistake as the Kaiser has made. He was told by all the staff of Europe that our army was only seventy thousand strong, and when we produced four hundred thousand, he was positively pained and disappointed at being so misled."

"In the same way we begin this war with a little army of one hundred and seventy thousand strong, but we and America have a talent for turning out immense forces when we are put to it, and our present job is to work day and night for some years in order to prevent all the states with a penchant for hegemony from challenging us in the future."

"Meanwhile we are getting on very well. Trade is reviving after the first shock."

London, Sept. 10.—PREMIER ASQUITH HAS ASKED PARLIAMENT TO INCREASE SIZE OF THE REGULAR ARMY BY AUTHORIZING AN ADDITION OF 500,000 MEN. THE REQUEST OF PREMIER WAS IN ACCORDANCE WITH HIS DECLARATION THAT ALL OF THE ENGLAND RESERVES WOULD BE USED IN CARRYING TO A SUCCESSFUL DETERMINATION THE WAR WITH GERMANY. IF THE ADDITIONAL 500,000 MEN WERE FOUND INSUFFICIENT HE WILL REQUEST MORE TROOPS.

CARING FOR REFUGEES

London, Sept. 9.—The hospitality of the British nation had been offered by the Government to those who lost their homes and have been rendered destitute by the destruction of Louvain and other Belgian towns.

There are indications that the invitation will be accepted on a large scale and the government has arranged for the reception and entertainment of those sufferers in London.

McKENNA HANDLES NEWS

London, Sept. 9.—Home Secretary McKenna has taken charge of the work of the official press bureau. In this connection he made the announcement that steps had been taken, in the recent re-organization of the cable censorship work, to provide for the prompt transmission to the dominion and to the United States of the news passed by the censors.

Mr. McKenna declined to commit himself as to when war correspondents might be allowed to enter the zone of warfare.

BRIDAL RECEPTION

Mr. and Mrs. C. V. Wells who have been at Bay Verte since their marriage here a short time ago, returned to the city last evening. A reception in honor of the bride is being held this afternoon at the home of her brother, Mr. W. G. Clark, Waterloo Row.

and when the hospitable door was at length reached, looking back I saw just as many behind me as there had been in front when I stepped into position. Only a portion of the sidewalk is given up to this clientele, the limits marked by a barricade of ice chests and packing boxes.

Most of the queue is composed of the femmes a tout faire (maids of all work); there are several housekeepers and many old men who in lieu of other work these work-ridden days are doing odd jobs of marketing and the like. The women are bareheaded and every one has some sort of receptacle in which to take back her purchases, preferably the popular flut. Most of them fill in the time by raptures of the havoc the mobilization has wrought in their domestic affairs. One young French girl is, however, quite removed from any such personal sentiment and with her eyes buried deep in a lurid covered volume reads during the whole hour and a half the romantic adventures of 'Prince Satan.'

Potin's is an enormous building on the Boulevard Haussmann with suggestions of the Alsace-Lorraine art in its colored skylight and mural decorations. Long tables are placed up and down the centre and along the aisles about which the crowd circulates freely, looking at the goods and reading the tags on which the fixed price of the day is written. I quote some of these:

SOME PARIS PRICES

In the butcher section, a distinct part of the big shop you find:

Calves' brains, 28c each; sheep's tongues, 35c each; half big lobster sold on the shell, 35c; a rabbit, 25c, with head and feet; best kidney, 35c; roasting chicken, medium size, \$1; a York ham (whole), 70c; extra fine, 80c; slices of boiled ham placed between pieces of paraffined paper, 17c to 19c; a hare pie, 39c.

Chocolate one may buy in this place from 32c to 40c per pound. Coffee, extra fine, 56c and higher. Cocoa is the same. Crackers—biscuits, as the English will persist in calling them—are sold under several amusing names; the prices are about the same as in our first-class grocery establishments. For instance: Ginger nuts 20c per pound; champ de Mars, 18c per pound; assorted 28c per pound; Marie Albert, Tzigane, Gazone, Moujik, each differing in some essential of shape or varnishing, from 18c to 25c per pound. In the canned goods department—Salmon 37c per can; trout 23c per can; lobster, 60c per can; royal, 48c; langoustine (crawfish) 30c per can; mackerel, 18c.

RUSSIA'S TO SMASH THE KAISER'S LEGIONS

London, Tuesday.—The Russian army, and certainly will, smash the Kaiser's legions and liberate Europe from the yoke of militarism. The importance of Russia on the land can be compared with the importance of Great Britain on the sea. These nations, acting in harmony with France and Belgium, will save the situation.

Since the beginning of the war I have anxiously sounded public opinion in London concerning Russia. I have received letters suggesting that the Russian army is of no value. I did not reply to these because I waited to prove the contrary with facts. That time has arrived, and I can only say that every Russian should be proud of the Russian army.

In radical newspapers I have read articles which foreshadowed danger if Russia crushes Germany, and these also discuss the danger for India from the Russian side.

This is a baseless fear. I, like my old chief, General Kuropatkin, can assure the English public that Russia never intends to make the slightest attempt on the independence of India. For move to the Far East was only to fix a certain strong border with Great Britain in Asia, which task was accomplished in 1895.

In Asia Russia never can be a rival of Great Britain. She is a faithful ally there as she is in the present great war. The Russian nation is proud and happy over the alliance with England, but we Russians, who join in cheering the troops of England, France and Belgium, would be happier still if, in response to the herculean efforts of Russia's great army, English public showed by their applause in public places and by floating the flag of Russia alongside those of the other allies their faith in the Tsar's soldiers, who also are fighting the battle of freedom.
