CONTINGENT
LEAVES TONIGHT**Company of the Seventy-First Regiment Will do Garrison Duty at
Halifax—Two Bands Will
Turn Out

The special Company from the 71st Regiment, consisting of fifty-two men under the command of Captain Howard F. G. Woodbridge, will leave this evening for Halifax to form a part of the composite regiment, which will relieve the Royal Canadian Regiment now on garrison duty at that place.

Lieut. Alva Good of this city, and Lieut. Benjamin Wade of Marysville, will act as subalterns, and Sergt. David Little has been selected as the color sergeant of the detachment. Sergt. Joseph Wilson and Sergt. William Masters, who only a few days ago returned from Valcartier camp, and Sergt. Bugler George Little formerly of the R. C. R., will also accompany the contingent to Halifax.

Arrangements are being made to give the boys a hearty send-off, and they will parade to the station at eight o'clock this evening, headed by the 71st Regimental Band and the Fredericton Brass Band.

Twenty-nine men arrived here on the noon train today from St. Stephen and Milltown and together and vicinity will bring the company with the volunteers from this city, up to the required strength.

This afternoon the men were equipped with uniforms, water bottles, side arms, bullet pouches, great coats and rifles, and at two o'clock the Company had squad drill in the barracks square under Color Sergt. Little, Sergt. Wilson and Sergt. Masters.

**SERG. MASTERS
HAS RELATIVES
AT THE FRONT**His Uncle a Member of the Royal
Warwickshire Regiment Which Recently Met With a Disaster
in France

Sergt. William Masters, formerly a member of the Royal Canadian Regiment, who is leaving for Halifax this evening with the special company from the 71st Regiment, fears that his uncle, Sergt. Charles Binney, was killed in a recent engagement in France when the Royal Warwickshire Regiment of England, was badly cut up.

Sergt. Binney had been attached to the Royal Warwickshire Regiment for a number of years and when England declared war on Germany, it was one of the first regiments ordered to the front.

Sergt. Masters has another uncle, Trooper Fred Binney, who is at the front with the 18th Royal Hussars and considerable anxiety is felt for his safety owing to the fact that regiment was also badly cut up in a recent engagement.


