ARKANSAS DEMOCRATIC PRIMARIES

Little Rock, Ark., March 26—Democrats of Arkansas in a primary election tomorrow will nominate a complete State ticket and members of the legislature, one United States senator and seven representatives in Congress. Nominations are considered equivalent to elections.

Senator Jeff Davis is a candidate for re-election and is opposed by former Congressman Stephen Brundidge of Searcy. The latter has stumped the State from end to end and his friends believe he has more than an even chance of winning the senatorship.

The contest for governor has been heated between Governor George W. Donaghey who desires a third term, and Joseph Robinson, who has represented the Sixth district in Congress for a number of years.

Statewide prohibition and taxation are the issues in the fight for the governorship. General Donaghey advocates Statewide prohibition through the medium of the initiative and referendum, to be submitted in the election to be held next September. He also advocates adoption by the people of the so-called Turner-Jacobson revenue act, passed by the last legislature, which seeks to revolutionize the tax and other revenue laws of the State.

Congressman Robinson, who is opposing Governor Donaghey for a third term, is inclined to make light of the prohibition question as a leading issue. He says, however, that if a majority votes for Statewide prohibition he will insist upon the its enforcement in the event he is elected governor. He opposed the Turner-Jacobson revenue act, claiming it would increase the taxes paid by farmers.

Arkansas has not adopted the presidential preference primary system, but ward and township mass meetings will be held tomorrow for the selection of delegates to the State convention, which in turn will name the delegates to the Democratic national convention. It is generally understood that Arkansas Democrats are for Champ Clark for President, with Woodrow and Judson Harmon running a fairly even race for second choice.

CHICAGO BENCH SHOW OPENS

Chicago, Ill., March 27—The eleventh bench show of the Chicago Kennel Club opened in the First Regiment Armory today and will continue until the end of the week. Both in the number and high class of the entries the show this year surpasses all of the previous exhibitions given by the club. A special feature is the presence of Walter H. Reeves of London, England, and P. E. Packwood, president of the English Collie Club, who will judge a number of the prominent breeds.
