BERLIN TO FETE AMERICAN HOTEL MEN

Berlin, May 2.—Two hundred members of the Hotel Men's Association of America, who with their wives and families, are making a tour of Europe, are due to arrive on this city Monday for a stay of several days. For the entertainment of the American bonifaces, their brethren of the German metropolis have joined in preparing a programme that is calculated to keep the visitors busy every hour of their stay in the city and to send them away with an exalted idea of German hospitality.

The hospitalities will be opened officially by the City of Berlin itself with a reception at the City hall, followed by a luncheon. On the evening of the same day there will be a dinner party at the celebrated Admiralty Ice Palace. The feature of the second day's programme will be an inspection of the colossal Kempinski restaurant where fifteen thousand people are fed daily. Other entertainment prepared for the visitors will include a tea party at the Zoological Gardens, an inspection of one of the great breweries, a visit to Potsdam, and dinners and luncheons at several of the leading hotels of Berlin.

NEWS FORECAST FOR COMING WEEK

Washington, D.C., May 1.—Numerous events of interest are on the calendar for the week, providing present schedules are not set topsy-turvy by developments south of the Rio Grande.

A wedding of much interest will be that of Miss Eleanor Wilson, youngest daughter of the President and Mrs. Woodrow Wilson, and Secretary of the Treasury William G. McAdoo, which is to be celebrated very quietly in the city on Thursday. In accordance with the wishes of Miss Wilson and Mr. McAdoo, the wedding will be very small, only the Vice-President and Mrs. Marshall, the cabinet, and the immediate members of the two families are to be present.

Tuesday will be one of the principal national holidays in Mexico and some anxiety is felt over the possibility that the patriotism of the people may find vent in attacks on American property wherever found. The day is the anniversary of the re-establishment of the Mexican republic, following the overthrow of Maximilian.

Delegations of women from every part of the country are to engage in a mammoth demonstration in Washington on Saturday for the purpose of calling the attention of Congress to the demands of the American women for the right to vote. The leading feature of the demonstration will be a great parade from the White House to the Capitol.

Women of the leading countries of the world are to gather in Rome the first of the week to take part in the quinquennial sessions of the International Council of Women. America will be well represented at the gathering. The discussions will deal with the rights and interests of women and children in all relations of life.

King George and Queen Mary are to be present at the dinner and ball to be given by Earl Curzon at Carlton House Terrace on Monday for the coming out of his eldest daughter, Lady Irene Curzon. The mother of Lady Irene, it will be remembered, was Miss Mary Leiter, daughter of the late Levi Z. Leiter of Chicago and Washington.

Other events of the week will include the annual May Music Festival in Cincinnati, the annual reunion of the United Confederate Veterans in Jacksonville, Fla.; the general conference of the Methodist Episcopal church, south, in Oklahoma City; the National Conference of Charities and Correction, in Memphis, and the National Conference of Jewish Charities in the same city.

WATER-FRONT DEVELOPMENT TO BE DISCUSSED

"Water Front Development" will form the theme of discussion at one of the sessions of the International Conference on City Planning to be held at Toronto on May 25-26 next. Mr. R. S. Gourlay, representative of the Board of Trade on the Toronto Harbour Commission will give an address on this subject, which should be of interest, not only to the citizens of Toronto, but to the whole country. Our harbors are national gateways and the Dominion Government is expected to contribute over six million dollars to this particular project.

The works now in progress at Toronto should prove of national importance in another respect also, viz by putting before other cities an example of what may be done by systematic planning for water-front development. The works proposed are of three kinds: (1) Industrial development (2) Commercial and dock development, (3) Park and boulevard improvements. They involve the filling in of Ashbridge Bay and the establishment there of a model industrial district with first class railway and lake transport facilities, the deepening of the Inner harbour and building of new docks; and the construction of a beautiful twelve mile driveway, extending along the entire water front, with a protected channel for small craft for the whole distance, lagoons, parks, islands, amusement grounds, bathing beaches, and everything that could be desired for summer pleasure. It is expected that the entire project will be completed in 1920 and at an estimated cost of upwards of nineteen million dollars. When completed it should place Toronto in an enviable position, giving it one of the finest harbors on the Great Lakes, stimulating its industrial and commercial expansion and providing its people with unrivalled recreation facilities at their very doors.

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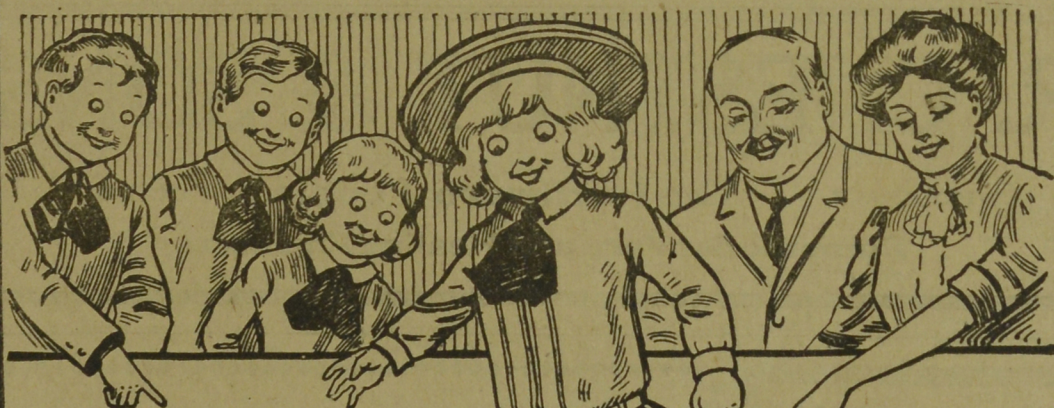
